Finding that many promises are unfulfilled, and, that hopes of progress too often are shatte-red, elder members of the commun-ity are disposed to wring their hands in dispair and take up an attitude of a "plague on both your houses". Even more marked and menacing is the fact that members of the younger generation tend to develop a cynical view of political life. To them democracy becomes the mere catchword of party interests, and talk about freedem and liberty a mask for those pol-iticians with a personal are to grind.

Therefore it should be in the interest of everyone who believes in democracy that changes will have to be made before it's too late.

In Ireland as in most christian countries, the well spring of freedom will be found at parish level. The minds of the Irish Statesman and every Irish democrat should therefore he focused on t the lesser community - especially on the rural parish (or chapel ar -ea) community which should be the primary basis of national erganised life. The Popes have ne-ver ceased to demand in their Encyclicals the observence of the laws of organic growth from bel-The answer is that unless people be trained to develop a sense of social responsibility which they can exercise on their own small local affairs, thus giving thom practical experience in the use of democracy, they will become socially and democratically atrophied, - leaving as the only alternative in the present condition of world affairs a rapidly growing bureaucracy leading to the omnipotent State. It is with these things in mind that the Republican Movement has prepared plans for the setting up of Provincial Parliaments for the four Provinces of Ireland. Great progress has been made over the past year. Already committees ha -ve been set up in Ulster. Conn-

(1) The armed struggle in Occupied Ire Land continues and enemy casualties over the past two weeks are as follows:

Killed - 5 British Servicemen;

Wounded - 30 British Servicemen, one member of the R.U.C. one Officer of the T.A.V.R. and one member of the U.D.R. A British Army helicopter was hit and forced to land near Forkhill on Tuesday, the 5th September, and 2 Crew members were wounded.

- (2) The Republican Movement was not re--sponsible for the bomb incident in Portadown on Tuesday, 5th Sept., in which a member of the U.D.R.was killed.
- (3) The public are again for the second time in two weeks strongly advised to avoid travelling in the vicinity of British Military Vehicles or Military Personnel as these will be subject to centinuous attack at all times. We note the narrow escape of a civilian car-driver in the Dungamon area last night.
- (4) The living conditions of Republican Prisoners awaiting trial at the Maze Prison, Long Kesh, are in direct violation of human rights - the food is bad, the prison is over-cr-owded, there are little facilities for recreation, and a number of prisoners are continually being brutally beaten, kicked and abused by the R.U.C. when they are taken to These prisoners are members of a resistance movement waging an armed struggle, the responsibility for which is accepted by the leadership of the Republican Movem-Therefore, the minimem that ent. these men are entitled to is political treatment, as exists in Cruml-in Road Prison. Every effort will in Road Prison. be made to protect the interests of these men.

The prisoners are now being denied proper medical treatment for skin ailments affecting all of them. It is believed that the general health of the prisoners is rapidly deteriorating due to the poor food, poor living quarters and an apalling lack of consideration shown by the authorities to the unhygenic and insanitary condition of the prison. STRIKE AT HAMILTON INTERNATIONAL SHANNON INDUSTRIAL ESTATE

The first all out Strike approved by the Irish Congress of Trade Unions commenced on Monday morning at the American owned firm of Hamilton International at Shannon Industrial Estate. All twenty two strikers are members of the I.T.& G.W.U. and they are seeking higher wages. The strikers rightly claim that the pay increases offered by the Management do not measure up to the te -rms of the National Wage Agreement. A Union Shop Steward was dismissed last week and seven others suspended for three days.

Basically the terms of the N.W.A.grant an increase of £2.50. per week to all workers. Hamilton International tried to coerse the workers into accepting £130p.per week and a so called merit increase phased over three years at in -crements of 30p. per week. This 30p. per week would be at the discretion of the Management and based on reports of "workers appraisal", a totally ridic-

ulous arrangement.

The deviousness of the American employer mentality is more than enough to boggle the mind, but they are not entirely to blame. The chief culprits are the Fianna Fail Government and the Industrial Development Authority. Recent advertisements in the Wall St., and other American Financial Journals by the I.D.A. invite and encourage the Industrial Capitalists to come to Ireland, where they will be guaranteed all the prerequisites for cheap and profitable investment. The inspired I.D.A. advertising paints the picture of a Country where the rapid making of dollars is assured, the path to profit strewn with shamrocks if not with roses. Great emphasis is laid on the availability of a large work force and Cheap Labour costs.

Cheap Labour costs.
The American policy of treating the Irish worker as a mere componant part in their money making machine is absurted. The Irish Worker is entitled to and expects a just reward for his labour. It would appear that the Americans and the Fianna Fail gombeens have learned nothing from the E.I. dispute of some years ago. It is about time for someone to tell them that the Irish worker will not meekly submit to any form of Industrial coersian, he will stand and fight for his just rights.

N.A.T.O. CONFERENCE

The National Association of Tenants Organisations is to commence a National Rent & Rates Strike within the next six weeks and will refuse to pay any arrears due in the event of any subsequent settlement. This decision in the six year campaign against differential Rents was agreed on unamimously at the annual N.A.T.O. Convention in Liberty Hall Dublin, which ended on Sunday last 10th September. This decision, was made "in view of the attitude of the Minister for Local Government, Mr. Molloy towards this Organisation and his obvious contempt for its Officers".

N.A.T.O. General Secretary, described the picture as one of militancy and determination. He was onnwinced that even with only one third support from its members N.A.T.O. could bring Local Government to its knees. Details would be worked out and the final "go ahead" given at a special delegate Conference of all N.A.T.O.Associations to be held in the Midlands within ons to be held in the Midlands within four to six weeks. The Strikes should all be co-ordinated and held simultaniously, he said local agreements have been reached in individual centres such as Cork with the result that the real culprit, the Minister for Local Government, has been left in t the background, The resolution that N.A.T.O. should contest next year's Local Government Elections was defeated by twenty one votes to ten. Mr.Larkin said that the role of Local Councillors was being restricted and strait-jacketed by legislation designed specifically to crush the will and determination of the ordinary people to have their own voice. He added that N.A.T.O: should realise their strength and settle for nothing less than a repeal of the 1966 Housing Act. The Convention unamiously passed resolutions calling and of Interment North and for the end of Internment North and South and they also called for the re-lease of all Political Prisoners he-ld in the Six County and Twenty Six County Prisons.

The British Army denial that they are using the Royal Victoria Hospital in Belfast for Military purposes is untrue. It is clear from the reports of people living in the area of the hospital and from photographs that a large number of soldiers are billeted in the grounds of the hospital, that Ambulances are regularily used to convey marksmen to trouble spots and that the Royal Victoria Hospital and Musgrave Park Hospital code names "Nightingale 1 and 2" are regularily used as bases from which British Army S.A.S. Patrols operate. (Dressed in civilian clothes). Sniper scopes (an infra red ray telespope device which enables the operators to see and shoot in total darkness) are hidden on the ho-

spital grounds. On Saturday Sept 2nd after a shooting incident in Leeson St., in which shots were fired from an unmacked van, it was seen to enter the gate into the Maternity Hospital which leads to the Army Post in Broadway, in what is part of the hospital grounds. The Nurses at the hospital have st rongly protested about the use of the hospital by the British Army. There can be no doubt that the British Army oresence at hospitals is in direct contrevention of the Geneva Convention which stipulates quite clearly that no Military personel should billet or camp near hospitals and that hospital buildings must not be used as observation posts. This is a clear case of more BRITISH PROYUGATION:
