THE BARRICADES ARE DOWN - BUT THE PEOPLE HAVE RISEN.

In a statement issued to the "TATTLER" this morning, the local unit of the Irish Republican Army congratulated the people of Ballymurphy and surrounding areas for the valient stand they are making against British aggression. In spite of tremendous odds and severe hardships the people have maintained the humour, courage and comradeship which has made Bally-

murphy famous throughout the world.

The British Army have attempted to humiliate and disillusion us on many occasions without success, and their Public Relations Officers are at this moment striving to boost the morale of their "Stormtroopers". Their latest effort was on Thursday when they declared that a soldier was fired on as he was boing taken to hospital with a broken leg. The soldier was in fact taken to hospital, for he had been wounded by a local active service unit and the ambulance did not arrive until after the attack to take two soldiers away on stretchers. One was hit in the upper chest region or the threat, and the second was less seriously wounded in the shoulder.

The British Army have stated that all civilians killed in their recent purge were members of the I.R.A. They have amitted to mention their own casualties while the Irish Republican Army have claimed two of the Irish dead as volunteers. Since the introduction of Internment, units operating in the Ballymurphy area have wounded seventeen British soldiers in sniping and machine-gun attacks, and at the same time defended the area against U.V.F. gunmen. Our brother units in adjoining Company areas have also inflicted severe casualties on England's Army of occupation and the support at local level has kept the morale of Volunteers at an all time high. It is a fact that the barricades are down, but the people have risen.

The statement concluded with an appeal for continued sopport and

co-operation.

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On August 6th. 1914, Asquith made a speech in the House of Commons

in which he said...

"We are fighting to vindicate the principle which in these days, when force, material force sometimes seems to be the dominant influonce and factor in the development of mankind, we are fighting to vindicate the principle that small nationalities are not to be crushed, in defiance of international good faith, by the arbitrary will of a stronger and overmastering power."

This is the reason Britain joined the two World Wars, but today we find her imposing that same overmastering power that she fought to destroy.

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THIS IS BRITISH JUSTICE.

The evidence against the British Army is indeed overwhelming and has been known to the world. One wonders how the British government is going to get away with this one.

These tactics have paid of in other countries such as Malaya, Aden and Kenya, so they thought it was just a matter of applying them here. But alas they have found out to their cost that this is not so. They must be wondering what manner of people we Irish are to take so much and come bouncing back again so quickly. It was always the Englishman's failing to understand Ireland and her people, to underestimate and fall into his own trap when he tried to impose sanctions or repression on us.

It's a true saying that the English never learn, and one lesson they have yet to learn and that is that you cannot force Irishmen to do anything
