REPUBLICANISM AND UNIONISM

According to Roy Bradford, old style Republicanism and old style Unionism are both out of date. He seems to think that Unionism is the Protestant version of Republicanism. This is just not so. In the first place, there is no other kind of Republicanism other than that of Tone, McCracken and Rossa.

We know that there are other people who would agree with Mr. Bradford, namely Mr. Cathal Goulding, Mr. Fitt, Mr. Hume, etc. But the principles of Republicanism are clear

and distinct.

For the benefit of younger people who may have been brainwashed to accept the doctrine that there is such a thing as new style Republicanism, we quote from a speech made by P. H. Pearse at Bodenstown, 1913, "Let us make no mistake as to what Tone sought to do -- to break the connection with England, the never failing source of all our political evils and to assert the independence of my country; these were my objects, to unite the whole people of Ireland, to abolish the memory of past dissensions, to substitute the common name of Irishman in place of the denominations of Catholic; Protestant and Dissenter. These were my means", and again at the grave of Rossa, "We know only one definition of freedom: It is Tone's definition, it is Mitchell's definition, it is Rossa's definition. Let no man blasphene the cause that the dead generations of Ireland served by giving it any other name and definition." "The clear true eyes of this man almost alone in his day visioned Ireland not free merely but Gaelic as well, not Gaelic merely but free as well."

Surely these are clear and solemn words in simple language, easily understood. How then can men stand up beside the grave of Tone and acclaim his doctrines while they are

propogating a defferent definition of freedom than his.

We cannot blame Mr. Bradford for his ignorance of Tone's definition of freedom. But we can blame those who persist in calling themselves Republicans. Everyone has the right to form his own definition, but let us not hear him claiming that this is Tone's definition or Rossa's definition.
