A MAFIA-STYLED CRIME RING WHICH HAS BEEN ENGAGED IN SUSTAINED CAMPAIGN OF TERROR AGAINST THE NATIONALIST PEOPLE.

The decision to smash the crime ring was taken after a new wave of incidents in which one young man, Sean McNamee, was brutally murdered and a garage, owned by a small cooperative concern in the Whiterock area, was gutted by arsonists.

Part of the Brigade statement issued on Wednesday evening read:

"Action has been taken against members of a criminal group whose activities have brought terror to the nation- the trademark of the pseudo Republicans. alist community. The group, a pseudo-revolutionary clique who masquerade under the name of the "Official Republican Movement," are at present engaged in a campaign of murder, arson, gangsterism and intimidation against the working-class peoples of the anti-

"The anti-social behaviour of the Mafia-styled clique culminated in the cowardly murder of a young Ander-sonstown man, Sean McNamee, several weeks ago, As a follow up to the killing a garage, belonging to a small co-operative concern in the Whiterock district, was burned to the ground, Numerous petty robberies and attacks on innocent civilians have also become

"The Belfast Brigade now warn the leadership of th "NLF" that further acts of Urban gangsterism will bring immediate action from the Irish Republican Army. We will not tolerate any group aiding the Bri ish forces in their campaign of terror against the Nationalists people.'

It is thought that the decision to smash the Belfast crime syndicate will be rigidly enforced by the Active Service Units of the Belfast Brigade.

"Any attempts at census taking should be immediately reported to your nearest Incident Centre, or to Central Office," he said.

Everytime you switch on the T.V. and tune into an English variety show you will hear, when the comedy slot is on, what are known as 'anti-Irish Jokes.' These are usually the 'Paddy the Irishman' type; stupid he is and how drunk he can be at all hours of the day. You know the stuff — like the one where British troops

and how drunk he can be at all hours of the day. You know the stuff — like the one where British troops are explaining to a newcomer to the six counties that if he should see a pin flying tolkrough the air he should run like hell, there is an Irishman nearby with a grenade in his motth!. All great stuff (?). especially when delivered in a rich Irish brogue with plenty of emphasis on the touching of the forelock, and so on. You will already have seen plenty of this humour but are you aware of the reasons behind this image building and the constant prejection of the Irish as being stupid, thick and rebellious, and capable of nothing other than digging holes and living off the dole? Like everything the British do, there are reasons behind the most innocent of moves and everything has an utterior motive which is not always obvious, until one takes the time to probe into the depths of why something should be as it appears.

The British are, by nature, the most hunourless of people, a fact known and stated by people from all parts of the World. The deadly seriousness with which the average Brit approaches life and all its aspects is reflected in their love of pomp and circumstance and their divine wish to take part in ceremonies which are a throwback to mediseavel times, complete with cost umes and dress from that particular period. This approach to life, coupled with the earnest belief that they are still a World power and a force to be reckoned with (General De Gaulle just turned in his grave)11 mean they are slow to accept the funny side of life.

Another facet which inhibits a sense of humour is that the British do not easily communicate with each other. Even those who have lived in any street in any town in England for the biggest part of their lives are not fully aware of just who lives at the other end of their street. Only a short time ago it was reported that an elderly man who died of old age in a certain city in the Midlands of England lay undiscovered for weeks and his body was badly decomposed when found. When a neighbour who lives only a few doors away was asked if she knew the deceased, she stated that she had lived 40 years in that street and had never seen the old man let alone talk to him. Imagine that happening in Ireland. It just could not happen here because we are a race who communicate with each other and it is only those who communicate with each other and it is only those who communicate with each other who are capable of a sense of humour. The British way of life does not allow that people should get gogether. to talk to examine and understand each other's point of view, so how can they be expected to have a homegrown sense of humour?

By comparison, take the situation which exists in any town in Ireland, North or South. There you will see that everyone knows everyone else and that the inhabitants of that town talk freely with each other free from inhibition and free to laugh and joke, knowing that offence is rarely caused and that things are taken in

the spirit in which they are intended. That's a facet of life which belongs to the Irish alone and it is a quality not appreciated by other races who adopt a holier-than-thou attitude with the stiff upper lip thrust forward in a menacing manner, defying anyone to laugh when they shouldn't. The Irish, by other standards, could be described as a simple race, but not the simple which is implied in the 'Paddy the Irishman' lokes mentioned above. Our simplicity lies in the fact that we can laugh at ourselves and see the funny side of situations and events that would have the average Brit speechless and serious with embarrassment. By contrast with the British image as straitlaced serious, we have the deser-

and serious with embarassment. By contrast with the British image as straitlaced serious, we have the deserved reputation of being a friendly and happy people who readily extend the traditional hundred thousand welcome to visitors to our shores. (Note that the hundred that the hundred thousand welcomes is extended to visitors. The exact opposite occurs in the case of invaders and those who would dominate and subject, then the hundred thousand would refer to bullets dispatched towards the unwelcome 'visitors' from the guns of the Provos). A true Irishman has the stated quality that he can laugh at himself and share with others the necessary humour which must be a part of life.

Unless people are prepared to laugh at themselves then it is wrong for them to laugh at others. This is where the Brit falls flat on his face. That race makes jokes about the Iran, the Jews, the Pakistanis, about the West Indian, sthe Africa.n, the Germans, nurvery rarely, if ever, about themselves.

By now you will be realising the point behind the Irish jokes now in great favour with the British comedians, in the palace of West Minister, and the other type who appear on stage, T.V., films, etc. This veritable flood of jokes' has only begun in earnest since the war between the Provos and the British Army kicked off in this decade. Even bearing in mind that theyre were always 'Paddy' jokes originating from the British 'miniland,' it is evident that the present campaign is cleverely designed to portray the Irish who are stupid and thick --

at a time when the Irish (or rather, those Irish who are in in the Provisional Movement) are intent upon driving the British out of Ireland for all time. This anti-Irish drive by the British comedy script writers is a reaction to the war being waged by the Provos and is meant to counter the admiration now being expressed by many countiers who are cheering the Provos on in their fight for freedom. What better way to boost the snagging morale of a dejected Nation than by continually projecting the 'other lot' as drunkards, layabouts and labourers one and all?

When next you hear the 'Paddy the Irishman jokes on T.V. you should smile — not necessarily at the joke itself — but at the pathetic attempt at image propag anda which is the real reason for the exercise. The Irish sense of humour is something they could not begin to understand, after all it's 'not cricket' to self criticise oneself, old chap.

To finally prove my point that the British are humour-less, let me tell you a TRUE story which you will not have read in any newspaper, and which occured quite recently at Knock R.U.C. Barracks (The R.U.C. are of course, by their very loyalities, British). The constables who were on duty at the barracks were just settling themselves down in front of the T.V. to watch the Wimbleton Tennis Tournament when suddenly the set went on the blink. A few hefty thumps and kicks did not cure the allment or cause it to behave in a reasonable manner (just the way the boot failed with the Provos, Jamiel). A call was then made to a local T.V. repair shop and they said they would send a few men around to look at the set.

Two men duly arrived at the Barracks and went through the customary search procedure before being allowed in. After a cursory examination the two men shook their heads and announced to the agitated audience that the set would have to go back to the shop for deeper examination. The set was carried out to the waiting van and the duty constable waved to the men as they disappeared up the street in the van.

Five minutes later, the same duty constable opened the station door for the two real repair men!!

MESSAGE FROM THE LEADERSHIP

The traditional message from the leadership of the Republican Movement was read out at the 71st Sinn Fein Ard Fheis last Sunday. The speaker, a life long member of the movement, was given a standing ovation following the speech.

He re-stated the three main objects of Oglaigh na hEireann which are the prerequisite of any settlement.

(1) The overthrow of British rule in Ireland and the establishment of a Democratic Socialist Republic.

(2) A general amnesty for all political prisoners in British, English and American Jails.

(3) "The main demand of Oglaigh na hEireann is for a British declaration of intent to withdraw from Ireland and give the Irish people the right to control their own destinies."

Delegates at the Ard Fheis stood when the speaker outlined the terms of the truce agreement, they erupted in spontaneous applaude when he went on:

"Whenever the British forces step over the agreed line of the truce, retaliatory action will be taken against them."

The will of the Republican Army to achieve their demands was evident in the words of the statements:

"Today, Oglaigh na hEireann is in a very strong position with the ability to win through to final victory. Let to be recorded that this is the last phase in Ireland's long fight for freedom. The British have had enough and they know that we can give them such more if they ask for it. Let each of us go forward from this Ard Fheis with the steadfast determination to give our utmost support to the Republican Movement, so that in the words of Terence McSwiney we may be able to say:

"Our future history shall be more glorious than that of any contempory state, we shall rouse the world from a wicked dream of material greed, of ryrannical power, of corrupt and callous politics to the wonder of a regenerated spirit and we shall establish our state in a true freedom that will endure forever."

O'BRADAIGH MAKES IT CLEAR THAT A BRITISH WITHDRAWAL, NOW INEVITABLE, IS ONLY THE BEGINNING STRUGGLE FOR A DEMOCRATIC SOCIALIST REPUBLIC

Once more we are gathered in national convention in , historic surroundings for the 71st Ard-Fheis of Slnn Fein. On behalf of the Ard-Comhairle it is my very pleasant duty to welcome you here, especially those of you who have been released from prison in the past year.

- In the course of the thirteen months which have elapsed since the Ard-Fheis of 1974, the struggle to which we all have dedicated ourselves reached a new and higher plane and took on a greater significance; I refer of course, to the fact that constant and unrelenting pressure on the enemy forced him to the conference table, not just for one meeting but for many.

As you well know, the unilateral Truce of goodwill on the part of Republican forces over the Christmas and New Year period did not meet with any worthwhile response from the British occupation Forces and therefore was not extended by the Republican leadership.

However, it did have the effect of bringing together face to face the duty accredited representatives of the Republican Movement — your movement and the rep-

resentatives of the British Government. During the weeks of renewed hostilities a bi-lateral Truce agreement was worked out and accepted on both sides. Hostilities were once more suspended and Truce Incident Centres were opened by both parties and operated as the most practical arrangement possible to prevent an unintentional breakdown in the new situation.

Discussions were then embarked upon towards securing a permanent peace in Ireland and for the Republic an Movement this meant and still means:

(a) a British withdrawal; (b) a New Ireland negotiated by the Irish people themselves; and (c) a general amnesty for all Irish political prisoners

In short, what we have been saying to the British is

if you intend to leave Ireland then we will do everything possible to smooth your path and make it easy for you; but if, on the other hand, you intend to remain in Ireland and to re-structure British rule here, putting a more acceptable and perhaps more human face on it, then if this is your intention make no mistake about it — we will contest every inch of the ground with you. And we shall win, because we regard British disengagement from Ireland now as inevitable.

The Truce was marred in its early stages by breaches or the part of the British and by a deliberate and planned campaign of sectarian murder. On May 15 in the British Parliament Mr. Merlyn Rees admitted (and I quote Hansard Vol. 892, No. 126, col. 628): "In the past three months the amount of IRA violence has been negligible," yet it emerged in the subsequent discussion that scores of people had been victim of sectarian murder in the same period.

It was about this time when a cliam was made from a source outside the Republican Movement that a declaration of intent to withdraw had been agreed upon at the talks, that a spokesman for the Alliance Party – that paragon of peace at all costs regardless of injustice – stated publicly that "the bullet and the bomb were preferable to political concessions to the Provisional IRA." Apparently their brand of peace is akin to that of Mr. Paisley – "Peace through victory," British victory, of course.

Later in the year when the scope of sectarian murder gangs had been extended outside of Belfast and the Murder Triangle of Portadown, Pomeroy and Augracloy where alone 40 people have died — and when the toll went into three figures, the UUUC had the temerity to issue a statement saying that the figure of toll "one hundred and twenty deaths since the Truce" was not acceptable"! But who caused these deaths, the vast majority of them sectarian murders? Was it not the paramilitary friends of the UUUC and are not those paramilitaries themselves in some casses members of the UUUC and

Likewise the "peacemongers" as they have been called, many of whom are quick to carry their crosses and finger their Rosary beads in public last Christmas and on other occasions, were exposed by the Truce for the arrant hypocrites they are. In typical one-sided fashion there was not a squeak of protest from them as 50, 60, 70 and even 80 unin volved and innocent people were methodically cut down in the early months of the Truce and the Nationalist people of the North were being driven demented with fear. No, no ministers of state or highly-placed churchmen rushed to picket UVF headquarters on the Shankill Road or UDA headquarters in East Belfast when the McKenna family were slaugh tered or Bleary darts club was machine-gunned, resulting in a multiple tragedy. It would appear that they find it much more congenial to beat their breasts under police protection outside our offices at Kevin Street, Dublin

Similarly, the British Government did not rush extra troops from England in response to these outrages, they did not close off gaps in the Peace-Line in Belfast or surround and protect isolated pockets of Nationalist people in East Antrim. Also in the face of continuing sectarian murder, Mr. Rees was swift

in releasing all remaining Loyalist internees, even those whom he himself had said were responsible for the greatest massacre and loss of life this generation has seen; I refer to the delibe ty people in a single evening in D an in May 1974 in support of al strike which was taking place a

al strike which was taking place:

Only a small number of highly-courageous priests diligently documented the sectarian murder campaign and exposed it to the world as a systematic attempt to break down the Truce and pressurise the Nationalise people into accepting a political settlement which would restore Loyalist supre macy. To these men of integrity every credit is due but the great majority of the alleged "peace" cur-saders have been shown up as two-faced people with double standards who rush to condemn by word and action Republican resistance while Loyalist and British Army killing is either ignored or just deplored "for the record." It was only when the Republican Army began to retaliate against the British for breaches of the Truce, including the shooting dead and wounding of civilians, the resumption of torture of prisoners and general harassment of the people that the mongers" appeared on the scene one more time in very self-righteous fashion.

Just as contemptible on the political front in their attitude to the Truce were the SDLP who called so persistently for peace, yet when an agreed and honourable Truce was entered into they were the first to criticise and condemn. They attacked the Incident



Centres, the very legs on which the Truce stands, saying that the Republican Leadership had "sold out for six telephone numbers," and this from the politicians who in an effort to cling to temporary power fined the rent and rates strikers 25 pence per week and sent the saliffs and the peelers to seize an ex-internee's cattlel But the attempts to wreck the Truce were not confined to the U.V.F., the U.D.A., the U.U.U.C., the Alliance Party, the SDLP or even the British Tory party, hungry as ever to make political capital out of Irish suffering and death, South of the border there was no response whatever to the new situation from the Dublin Government or opposition. The hunger-strike in Portloiase Jail ground on for forty-five day until victory was wrong from a grudging and vindictive administration by the starving men, whose dedication wins our warmest admiration and support.

During the escape attempt on St. Patrick's Day, Republican prisoner Thomas Smith was shot down in cold blood and his funeral here in Dublin made the occasion for a highly provocative and over-bearing show of force by the Fine Gael and Labour Coalition. The fourth anni versary of internment was seized on to confront a Sinn Fein demonstration outside Portlaoise Prison and to [baton the participants in a most brutal fashion worthy of the RUC in their hey-day before the ordinary people subdued them.

HARASSMENT CONTINUED

No relaxation in harassment of Republicans or collaboration with the British took place. Quite systematically the Dublin Cabinet set up a special squad of the political police in April to hunt down our VIce-President Daithi O Conaill and privately promised "head-money" as a reward to whoever would arrest him. Three months later he joined two others of the Feakle peace-makers, JB, O' Hagan and Kevin Mallon in Portlaoise. And so in a year when we welcomed home Ard Chomhairle members Barney McFadden and John Joe McGirl, our Vice-President was removed from the scene at a most vital stage and Mary McGuigan was returned to Armagh Jail for resisting RUC incursions into Ardoyne during the Truce.

A word of appreciation is due to the ordinary people who manned the Incident Centres 24 hours per day and to the Sinn Fein members who assisted them; your work was out of the public eye but was on indispensable component in making the Truce work. In addition excellent work every many long hours was done by Sinn Fein members in staffing 20 Citizens Advice Centres throughout the Six Counties, thus forming links with the ordinary people and assisting them in their many problems of day to day living.

These Advice Centres which have set a head-line for the whole 32 counties, the sale of literature, records, tapes and the showing of the special political education lecture for public viewing are the surest way to build political support among the people and prepare for the day when Sinn Fein will appeal to the electorate in every corner of this island

This is vital work and the testing time may come sooner than many people think. Let us get ready. If we fail

to make our mark with sufficient strength, then the situation may be gone beyond recall and the shape of the New Ireland may crystalise into a 32-County Free State

As a follow up to our success in having 26 local councillors elected last year and to make good the deficiencies which thec campaign exposed a pamphlet, confidential to members, was brought out, entitled, "A Broad-Base; the need for local involvement." This public

Base; the need for local involvement." This publication and the Publicity Handbook are ready-made weat-pons to be used in building local support. In addition, the booklet "Mining and Energy" joined the "Quality of Life in the New Ireland" and "Eire Nua" policy documents in outlining the kind of Ireland we want to build when the British have left our country.

We moorn the deaths in that Long Kesh on internees Hugh Gerard Cooney and Jim Moyne; we welcome the repartriation of Dolours and Marion Price, Hugh Feeney and Gerald Kelly after their grim ordeal of hunger strike and fored-feeding for over six months; we also aim at securing the transfer to prisons in Ireland pending their release of the other four Winchester prisoners and all their comrades in English jails; inhuman ill-treatment, torture, forced confessions and savage sentencing of Irish prisoners in England.

The re-writing of Irish history continues unabated, and, unfortunately, some highly intelligent people in the media, have prostituted their integrity in this rggard also. The trend is evident in everything from the rehabilitation of certain historical personalities, to the selection of persons for commemoration on stamps—toactual sanction of text-books in Irish schools which try to comfort young and confused minds with an assurance that this country was not always even a province, or, a dependent neo-colony, but in fact a fully-fledged part of the United Kingdom and the Empire.

It will be interesting to see what attention, if any, will be officially given to the commemoration of the 1916 Rising on the diamond jubilee next Easter. EAster Week has been politely dropped from the official calendar in the past two years, by people, whether they like it or not, who owe whatever pomp power and offices they possess today directly to the heroic and selfless sacrifices of the men of that Rising. But of course this situation will not continue. The national re-think which sprang, particularly among the youth, from the commemoration of 1966 was in some measure responsible for the development of events in the North since 1969. Try as they may, North and South, the Leinster House establishment cannot turn back the clock or ignore the risen people. No country can allow the type of ammoral official tyranny we have experienced in the attempt of recent years to suppress truth, justice and reality to continue indefiniently.

Dr. Conor Cruise O'Brien, Dr. Fitzgerald, Justin Keating and other "intellectuals" of the regime would, no doubt, scream to high Heaven if a writer, imprisoned for whatever reason and after the most immaculately fair trail, in any part of the world, had his books and papers destroyed and his private possessions, including religious objects, smashed for spite. Except, of course, if it happens to be somebody like Eamonn MacThomais. But

No evidence or witnesses for the prosecution were produced and vet in such a trial - which had a strong anti-defendant bias from the 'judge,' and which ignored the evidence of English people who had obviously no axe to grind - all the defendants were

found guilty and sentenced to: Paul Hill - Life, Life and 20 years for conspiring to cause ex plosions (whatever that means); Patrick Armstrong - 35 years, Life, 10 years for conspiring to commit murder and 20 years for

conspiring to cause exposions; Gerard Conlon - 30 years, life and 20 years for conspiring to cause explosions; and Carole Richardson - Life and Life.

The sentences were decided by an English Tory wearing a wig - a Minister Donaldson.

SDLP councillor and collaborator Tom Donnelly today calledon all Catholics to support and join the RUC "police service". AMERICAN EYE VIEW

If the IRA revolutionaries were from any other country in the world, our fashionable liberals would hail them as revolutionary heroes and cheer for David O'Connell (the Arafat of the IRA). As it is, the New Republic recently dismissed them as

a fewhundred Catholic revolutionaries who want to "cow one million Protestants who are determined to keep Ulster as British as Devon or Lancashire."

Since so little is known by most Americans about the Ulster situation and since the journalism on the subject is so incredibly sloppy, a few points must be made for the record.

The British regime in Northern Ireland is as colonialist as the British regimes in India or

Historically the regime has

been oppressive. The colonial groups sent by the British to Ulster have oppressed the Catholice groups in the north for more than three centuries.

However, in the 19th century there was, for a time, particularly in the city of Belfast, an eraof good feeling in the city of Belfast, Protestants contributed to the construction of Catholic churches, and Catholic bishops were communal leaders. In the Revolution of 1798, Catholics and Protestants in the north fought side by side against the

However, toward the end of the last century, the British government, particularly under the leadership of Lord Randolph Churchill, began to stir up anti-Catholic feeling in the north as an excuse for not granting home rule to Ireland. This encouragement of bigotry was especially

strong during the 1916-22 revolution and civil war period.

The British are to a substantial extent responsible for the situation in Northern Ireland and for the persistence of religious conflict.

The conditions at the Long Kesh concentration camp and the torture of prisoners there will compare with anything in the Soviety Union, Brazil, or China.

Finally, historically, the British have played the role of agents provocateus in Irish conflicts. There is evidence that the bombings in Dublin last spring and in Birmingham recently were not the work of the IRA (which always claims credit for its bombings) but the work of the British fecret service. We cannot say for sure, but on the basis of the past performance of the British, government in Ireland, this is certainly a strong possibility.

"MAZE PRISON OFFICERS INVOLVED IN ATHLETICS."

On Saturday 18th October, 1975, the Lisnagarvey Harriers, Lisburn held a series of Road relays in Wallace Park Lisburn. These relays which are held annually are open to all of Irelands renegade bodys in Irish athletics, namely the Northern Ireland Amateur Athletic Association (Affiliated to Britain).

Their Ireland, as you may guess is Ireland as laid down by England, it.e. a 28 County I reland, On account of their giving his moral support to Mother England they in turn are given all sorts of sponsorship from various groups whose ultimate aim is to maintain the link with Britain. That link which has been the scourge for so many generations and has sent so many Irishmen to their graves in an effort to rid the Country of this scourge.

However on Saturday 18th October 1975, sponsorship of another nature showed its ugly head for the first time when that "fine body of man," that group of individuals who are constantly torturing Irishmen in Long Kesh, namely the Maze Prizon officers. A number of threatening leaflets purporting to come from "the military arm of the Cymric nation," are being studied by British Special Branch officers. The leaflets, which were unsigned, were sent to several newspapers in England and Wales yesterday.

"On behalf of our patriots of past and present and our generations of the future, we hereby inform betrayers of the Cymric heritage and aliens coming into our midst, that a new phase in the struggle is about to begin."

A woman from the Bogside was invited onto UTV's "Lunchtume" programme to discuss the North's contribution to in international Women's Year. Before the show began, she engaged in conversation with a singing RUC constable, who believes in Jesus, and who was going on the air to pronounce his beliefs.

this will not continue. Sooner or later a halt will be called, and the new barbarians hiding behind their masks of culture, toleration and moderation will be exposed. Sinn Fein's duty is to speed that day.

Even though the logic of Whitaker economics and the EEC leads in the opposite direction, the political pressure from hard-pressed people on the ground has forced the Government into another "Buy Irish" campaign. Sinn Fein pioneered campaigns such as this and naturally supports it. We doubt however the sincerity of some of those engaged in the campaign — for the same reason as we question the sincerity of those now crying about the EEC Regional Fund. These are the people, who

through their political activities, brought about the present situation. Erosion of the Irish home market by outside products of all shapes and sizes is inevitable in the EEC Free Trade situation, Free Trade in groceries is as "natural" as free trade in television channels, given the current outlook of the Free State regime.

The work of the Ulster Executive of Sinn Fein over the past year has been outstandingly significant. On March 25th, the day Mr. Wilson announced in Belfast the date of the new Stormont Convention, Sinn Fein indicated that its attitude would be one of "Boycott." There were two reasons for this:

(a) the Constitutional Convention was based on the artificial area of Six Counties and would inevitably re produce the sectarian headcount and predictable result: (b) the British Government would have the final say regardless of the outcome.

In the event the Boycott was a resounding success, Every area worked without stint; 350,000 leaferst and 120,000 posters were distributed and extensions eadvertising engaged in; even the prisoners from their cells and cages sent out their messages of support and encouragement; public meetings and canvassing took place in what can only be described as an "election outside an election," The SDLP's claim to be the sole representatives of the Nationalist people was shown to be without foundation; the Boycort lost them east, thousands of votes and they emerged with about 40% of the Nationalist electorate. The remainder boycotted the Convention and for this Sinn Fein takes full credit. Here was the political action — in unorthodo it shaling granted — which our opponents cried out for and they did not like it because it was so effective.

Quite frankly, Sinn Fein does not just want the British to go. That is merely the beginning. The Ulster Loyalists must govern themselves in a New Ulster and a New Ireland, so also must the Ulster Nationalists and every other community in Ireland, We want a Socialist Federal Ireland where the small community flourishes and exploitation of man by man is no more. We want all to enjoy the fruits of their labour and of our natural resources, as well as of our cultural heritage.

The following is a statement from the Belfast Executive Sinn Fein.

As the Loyalist politicians of the UUUC prepare to submit their proposals for a resurrected Stormont, to the British Government Sinn Fein draws the attention of the ordinary people to the two major political alternatives of who face them, as represent-ed by the policies of the UUUC and the Republican Movement.
