MAKING ROOM FOR INTERNEES

John Taylor got himself into one hell of a row at Stormont when it was dragged out of him by a simple but innocous question from Paisley who wanted to know about the early release system of criminals from Crumlin Road Prison. Poor John had to admit that from August 9th — Internment Day— in order to make room for those detained or interned they made sure they had enough space by allowing out 359 prisoners who still had periods of imprisonment to serve, from a few days to 51 weeks. Paisley and Beattie had got him in their net alright, they then began to hit him with facts and figures showing that one of these prisoners released was charged within a few hours with the crime of murder . . . that another one was being hunted by the police on a very serious charge, others who had been refused the Royal Perogative were released, in some cases on the very same day.

So you see my friends political opposition to Faulkner and his regime is more dangerous than having 359 members of the criminal classes walking about the streets.

"NORTHERN IRELAND LABOUR PARTY"

You must hand it to Brian Garrett of the N.I.L.P. and pity him at the same time. TRADE UNION NOTES

I am sure the workers employed at the Tilley Lamp Co. in Dunmurry must have laughed their heads off when they read in the Press, that their managing director Norman Whitaker had received the O.B.E. at Buckingham Palace on Friday, (3-12-71). This factory is one of those type where discipllne is army style, and it has been known for the supervisors to snoop on the workers even in the toilets, one story being of the foreman who put his head under the opening of the door to find out who was in the box and got a boot in the face.

But even the loyalty of the supervision does not give them security, one of their foremen who was absent for several weeks due to an accident, had his cards sent to him. It is about time the workers in this factory began to get off their knees and fight.

The recent wage awards to Clerical Workers and Technical Staff of most of the engineering works in the Belfast area have been agreed on the basis that the unions allow the managements to bring in representatives from Consultant firms to make a survey on greater efficiency in the industries relating to staff workers. For instance DATA in agreeing a £4.50 rise agreed that £1 of it was for this purpose. The Clerical Workers In their £2.50 rise agreed that 75p of it was for this purpose also. This is ridiculous at a period when there are 65,000 unemployed in the Six Counties. No union should agree to what in effect is really that more of their members should join the unemployed. But it is up to the members themselves to see that these agreements don't work.

This monthly newspaper printed and published by George Allport, a small town unionist politician who has never really made it in the political field, but has struggled for the last ten years in trying to make his broadsheet the official newspaper of the Unionist Party, and thereby become a man of influence in the making of policy which would give him the outlet for all his frustrations at playing second fiddle to the crop of stupid people who are, according to George, making a mess of his beloved 'Ulster.' Information This one works Received

Few if any of the conclusions of the committee set up by Mr. Faulkner to review the Security arrangements at Crumlin Road Prison, are expected to be published. The committee which has already begun its investigations is expected to report its findings to Stormont before Christmas.

Hotly tipped to be one of their recommendations, is a possible proposal to transfer to English Prisons, all Republican prisoners deemed to be "top security risks.' Hotly denied is the story that the committee intends to travel to Dublin to interview recent escapees from the prison to see if they could offer advice about the future arrangements in the jail.

Enquiries at the Ministry of Finance have failed to ascertain whether or not a substantial amount of money was made available during the week to the Home Affairs Department for expenditure incurred in installing a new alarm system in the prison, following the total inadequacy illustrated by the present one during the recent breakouts.

VOL. ANTHONY NOLAN

Republican sources to-day stated that the young man shot dead in a house in Cranford Street, Belfast was a Volunteer of the I.R.A. Vol. Anthony Nolan, 20 years of age, Staunton Street was accidently killed while cleaning weapons in preparation for an operation due to be carried out later in the day by Active Service Units.
