REVOLUTIONARY FORCE USED TO HIGHLIGHT STATUS ISSUE

Throughout the occupied Six-Counties comrades of the men in H-Block, Long Kesh Concentration Camp, last Monday mounted over one hundred and twenty operations in a co-ordinated strike to highlight conditions for those denied political-status - 14 men in Long Kesh and two girls in Armagh Gaol.

The South Armagh ountryside was cut off within minutes of the IRA mobilisation and the railway line between Newry and Dundalk was blocked as were all main border trunk roads in the area. The IRA in Crossmaglen has threatened to block the railway and all the roads permanently if the political status issue is not resolved. Such action would cripple north/South communications at its most direct point and would bring to a halt all heavygoods trade.

North Armagh IRA

North Armagn Infa also played an active part in the mobilisation; again the rail track was blocked and bobby-trapped, commercial vehicles were used as barricades across main thoroughfares and at the M1 roundabout two RUC men were injured by a bomb in a planned operation. In County Fermanagh outside a customs post on the Enniskillen to Swanlinbar road a suspect bomb caused havoc for several days. Another suspect bomb on a bridge at Silverwood, near Lurgan, closed the railway line at another point.

The heaviest concentration of IRA activity was in Belfast where nine bombing operations were carried out and dozens of hoax bombs and hoax bomb warnings disrupted the commercial life of the city and its suburbs. In two of the bombings a hotel was destroyed and a bus depot attacked.

hotel was destroyed and a bus depot attacked. Claiming responsibility, and explaining the attacks, the Belfast Brigade, Oglaigh Na h-Eireann said in a statement:

"Today's operations, whilst intensifying and contributing to the continuing struggle to bring to an end British imperialist involvement in Ireland, have been co-ordinated with our comrades throughout the occupied Six-Countles, to highlight the intolerable conditions in H-Block, Long Kesh and the issue of

political status."
"For 11 weeks now sentenced Republican prisoners in H-Block have been held in solitary confinement naked, in insanitary conditions, and forbidden to attend Mass all because they rightly refuse to accept criminal status."

The next part of the Belfast Brigade's statement was censored by the British media:

"These conditions under which captured Irishmen are subject to in their own country were legislated in an English Assembly, without protest from the English public, impassive to the torture and brutality carried out in their name.

carried out in their name.

"The Inconvenience to the bourgeois business-class means little to us in comparison with the plight of our prisoners and the uncessing harassment of our people. Christmas to the working class people of Republican areas means continued harassment, raids, arrests, beat-

ings and torture.'

The peaceful protests of the last three months, which united thousands of genuine people demanding the retention of political status have been ignored. Thus the Irish Republican Army's display of revolutionary force to highlight this issue.

Other IRA operations throughout the week resultin a soldier being seriously woun the Whiterock the Whiterock reservoir.
A hoax-bomb planted outside Fort Monagh Army base in Turf Lodge caused panic among the Occu-pation Forces who were then fired on by a hidden Volunteer. Last Saturday two bombs were at the homes of the former Police Authority chairman, lan Fraser, and the Army G G.O.C British House, the David bourgeois Malone Road

area.
And on Tuesday, Volunteers in Keady, Co, Armagh, hijacked a van and mounted an attack on the local Army-RUC base three miles out of the town. The gentlemen returned the van to its owner after the attack.

The essential street protests and demonstrations in support of political status must continue. The Irish Republican Army's show of soli-

darity with the prisoners will definitely increase morale, not just among the isolated prisoners, but in the hearts of the revolutionary people who now see the striking capabilities of their Freedom

icicles hang from the huts and the frost has built it's own venetian blinds on the wire. They turn the fences into dull grey the wire. They turn the fences into dull grey shimmering walls. Looking straight at the wire you can see only one expanse of fuzzy optical wall. Looking at it from the side, through the shutters of ice the football pitch with watch-towers comes focus. The whole into camp is white-washed in frost and only the drip, drip, drip, of it's thaw breaks the silence.

At the front gate a few measly sparrows hoke among the bins, a robin flaunts it's red-breast and a pair of pied wagtails patrol their territory between the cages. Screws, wrapped in their winter great coats huddle in watch miserable reflections of all they survey

In cage 10, An Madra Rua pulls his box of dinner scraps into the yard. He waits for the sea-gulls to arrive. They wheel in as if by appointment, squeal-ing and screeching, in great flocks, one hundred or maybe two hundred birds. It reminds you of Bangor, Ardglass or, in a place like this, of Duncrue Street. The odd pair of rooks flap in, among the sea-gulls, and from his vantage point on the cage fence, a solitary grey-hooded crow, glares dis-dainfully at his ill-mannered relations.

To my left the search-lights above the H-Blocks, crane high over it all. In cells young POW's can be found, sitting or lying on the floor, always in a corner. At half-past seven this morning break-

The POW sits, wrapped in a blanket, as far from the pisspot of stale urine as the small cell permits and eats the mush from its The governor and doctor make their rounds. Both stand in the doorway, look, nod, comment on the weather and leave the POW's health will never be mentioned - as long as he continues to hreathe. breathe.

At half seven the breakfast is removed and the dinner is left in. At 4.30 the dinner is removed and the tea is left. The cell is searched every day - a bare gerrybuilt dungeon with a naked man in one corner but it is searched anyway. Last night, as every night, a Screw checked it at least once every half hour.

This time last year Frank Stagg lay in a similar cell, lay alone and hungry, alone - waiting for death

BRIT BULLY BOY TACTICS IN ARDOYNE

On Tuesday morning the Brit Army carried out an intensive search of Ardoyne Sinn Fein Advice Centre. When they realised the Centre was operating legally and was offering an essential service to the people of the area they became annoyed and in order to "justify" their search they explicated order to "justify" their search, they confiscated

46 Republican Resistance Calendars. They refused to give a receipt for them, using their usual Bully Boy tactics of threatening to arrest one of the centre workers.

The same regiment have vandalised all the street lighting in the area, recently repaired by electricity workers.

WHAT IS OPTION TWO?

As forecast in the columns of this paper the subject of 'inegotiated Independence' has become a focal point of discussion over the past number of weeks, the debate encom-passing many different shades of political opinion.

What was once a subject of ridicule has now become a potential political plat-form for many 'respect-able' politicians and various individual politicos.

The question is, why? Firstly, it is the opinion of the author that the present discussion is a political manipulation of a realisation by those involved that the British government has committed itself to a policy of physical with-drawal from Ireland.

Secondly it is quite possible that by allowing such speculation and discussion without combatting them with convincing denials with convincing denials the British government has indirectly made its declaration of intent to withdraw. A wide spectrum of political opinion has now confirmed the repeat-ed claims of the Republic-an Movement that the British are withdrawing, and in the wake of this confirmation a radical political realignment is taking place throughout the 32 counties of Ireland.

This realignment is based on the three options open to the British government which will seek to leave behind structures of government by which with can continue to exe political and econom exert political and economic control in Ireland as it did through the "Free State," through the "Free agreement of 1922.

Its first option is to remain as an occupying force in the 6 counties. Its in the 6 counties, its second is an "Independent Ulster" co-operating with the Free State, and its third, and best option, is a 32 county Free State based on a structure of neo-colonial Federal government /2e neo-colonial Federal government, (26 and 6).

either case one of the main priorities would be the elimination of the RepublicanMovement, its members and its support-ers. The first option is no longer viable for the British government because of the military, political and economic cost. The encouraged discussion of "Negotiated Independence" therefore represents a phased movement the encouraged the enco ment towards the second of the British government's three options. (The discussion is being encouraged because it is not being discouraged by a firm and credible commitment from the British government to

document from the loyalist paramilitaries, the week-end 'talk-in' at Corry-meela, and the 'exchanges' meeta, and the exchanges between members of the SDLP and ULCC are all indicators that "option 2" has now been well and trully launched. (That those engaged in the "Negot iated Independence "Negotdiscussions are concerned about the attitude of the Republican Movement is illustrated by the fact that one of the major participants at Corrymeela made a point of securing a copy of Vindicator's last article

If its participation could be secured and the scope of the discussion limited to a 6 county "Independent Ulster" the "Independent Ulster" the British government would be well on the way to securing "Option 2" and a positive movement towards "Option 3." The preparatory work for wards "Option 3." The preparatory work for "Option 3" began back in 1973 with the mythical "Boal plan," which was Desmond Boal's conception of a Federal Ireland with an Ulster province of 6 counties. Since then cred-ibility to such a solution has been given by Prof. John Robb, Jack Lynch and surprisingly Fr. Desmond

The reality of the present situation is that various political groups and in-dividuals who now recognise the withdrawal symptoms of the British government's policy, are 'doctoring' the policies of the Republican Movement to secure future positions for secure future positions for themselves under "Options 2 and 3" of the British government's withdrawal strategy. As was pointed out on the front page of last week's "Republican News" now is the time that the Republican Movement should be organizing the should be organising the people behind its basic policy of "power to the

people," as personified by the "People's Assemblies." The sad fact appears to be however that the political benefits of the Republican Army's sucesses seem to be reaped by those outside the Repubthose outside the Repub-lican Movement, and that unless the Movement expands its policies beyond its present local confines, we may well be facing a 1922-type settlement with Chilean-type implications for the Republican Move-ment

MANCHESTER MARTYRS REMEMBERED

On Sunday, November 28th, 1976, in the fore-noon, the annual Manchester Martyrs Commemor-ation was held at Moston Cemetery, and wreaths were laid on the graves of the three Irish patriots, who were executed on November 23rd, 1867 by Irish organisations including Sinn Fein and other wings of the republican movement. At the monument erected to their memory,

and recently partially destroyed by fascists, an oration was delivered by Mr. Fionnbarra O' Dochartaigh, [Bogside,

Derry] who was formerly a prominent figure in the civil rights struggle in the North of Ireland. The commemoration ended with two minutes silence for all those who died in the struggle for Irish indepen-

ORATION A Chardi Gael, Here in the

Here in the city of Manchester towards the Manchester towards the end of July 1867, a convention of 300 delegates of the Fenian Movement elected Captain Thomas J. Kelly as their Chlef of Staff of this international organisation. Kelly, who had been sent from the American wing of the movement to plan a rebellion against British domination in Ireland, was arrested within a few months. On his way to Salford prison on board a Salford prison on board a locked van, an attempt was made to free him by his comrades. The result of the action was that a prison guard was accidently killed, while endeavouring to remove the locks. A number of Irishmen were later arrested, and three were hanged on November 23rd. in this city. These men, William Phillip Allan, Michael Larkin and Mich-

ael o'Brien became popularly known as the Man-chester Martyrs. For this reason we are gathered today at this historic spot, where their mortal remains have been laid to rest, to remember their brave stand at the agony of facing the gallows, which helped swing Irish sympathy behind the Fenian Brotherhood in those days.

Manchester, at this period was the headquarters of the Fenian movement and from this city preparations were being made for the overthrowal off impartialist rule in Ireland.

Fenianism had strong links with other revolutionary groups throughout the world, and had sworn members in all the major-capitals of the continent. North America, and Australia. Its policies were directed at trying to make directed at trying to make a better life for our own people, and encouraged progressive groups, includ-ing the Trade Union Move-ment here in Britain and

yed an important role the struggles of the British working class and in a great many ways the workers of both our countries understood that their struggle was one and the same struggle, namely to end capitalist exploitation, within the sweat shops and among the agricultural labourers. Today, sadly the British working people do not understand that both our struggles are still the same, even though we in Ireland have adopted different tactics, but if the Germans had landed the Germans had landed and occupied Britain, would not the young men of this city, be engaged in warfare. Would not the women of Britain join in the struggle, and together drive out the invader. Above all, we are fighting for a new social order based on equality. We are fighting for a democratic socialist republic; and when that day dawns our peoples that day dawns our peoples will have established a much greater degree of



liberty and fraternity. We say to British workers, we are not your enemies, but rather we have the same enemy, the exploiters of our mutual labour, the speculations of land and capital, who place profit above people, and the needs of both our peoples. Let us together struggle for that new society, but our unity can only be achieved when the army of the ruling class

is withdrawn from our country. It is not the workers army, for the day will come when they will turn their armour country the workers are the workers. against the workers of Liverpool, London, and Manchester.

For a just and lasting peace, British working people must now demand, "Troops Out Now" and self-determination for the Irish people as a whole.

ARRIVAL OF PARAS HERALDS NEW **WAVE OF** REPRESSION

From the arrival of the screaming at residents in paratroop Regiment in the their cars to put their Falls, there has been a lights out. The dangers sharp but subtle rise in harassment. It is now alharassment. It is now al-most an hourly occurrence for residents to be stopped in the street and screen-ed, many of them being asked foolish questions.

Members of the local cumann witnessed a young girl aged about 7 being a foot patrol, ioned. Schoolstopped by questioned. girls of 14 and 15 years are being stopped and asked to open their coats to be searched. In one incident a man was stopped and accosted by a foot-patrol as he knocked his brother-in-law's door. He was accused by a Para of using a secret knock, the next day the brotherin-law's house was raided and he was arrested. The Paratroop's favourite method of patrol is in open jeeps and in the spell of foggy weather recently they roamed our streets with no lights, Paratroop's favourite

in this type of activity are obvious with the dramatic rise in road deaths in the past 2 weeks. Last Sunday several women coming out of Clonard Monastery were almost run down by a jeep, after which the Brits hurled verbal abuse at the women.

Our investigations of other areas indicates that the same pattern of harassment is going on. These soldiers soldiers are stopping people informing them that they have seen nothing yet. STAGGERING **FIGURES** RELEASED BY BROWN

In the wake of the IRA's onslaught on the already shaky British economy comes the news that the cost of keeping the Brit army in the Irish war cost zone is costing Westmin-ster a staggering sixty three million pounds this

year. The figures were given by Britain's Army Under-Secretary Robert Brown in answer to a written question in House of Commons.

It was revealed that the figures are £3 million up on last year.

VICTORY FOR THE PEOPLE

The Irish people with the help of their international working-class allies last week won a major victory when the five judges of the Supreme Court in Dublin quashed the death sentence on Marie and Noel Murray. They had been sentenced to death by hanging on the 8th June, six months the 8th June, six months ago by the Special Criminal Court in Dublin. They were the first persons ever to be sentenced to death by this notorious court and should Marie Murray be hanged she would be the the first woman to be hanged since the 26 county state was set up.

But the fight for Justice for Noel amd Marie Murray has only begun. The judges of the Supreme Court were only agreed on one thing on Thursday 9th December when they December when they handed down their judgement. That was that the ment. That was that the Special Criminal Court had mishandled their trial the first place and that the Court of Criminal Appeal had also misdirect-ed itself. This overwhelmcondemnation of the Repression Courts which was set up especially to deal with Republicans in the first check to Re-pression in the 26 county state. And it is a political response to public opinion at home and abroad which was shocked by the details of the "trial" the Murrays had and expressed its revulsion by protests from Tokio to Madrid and

from Limerick to Derry.
The campaign for reprieve of the Death Sen-tence on the Murrays was a straight fight between the Garda Representative Body with all the support it could command in the free State government and the media and the ordin-ary people who hated injustice and repression. The Murray Defence Committee had no hidden backers, it could command the support of no estab-lishment. The 26 county daily papers, radio and television were closed to it and when it resorted to putting up posters in Dub-lin four of its members were charged with "threatwere charged with "threat-ening and abusive behav-iour to a member of the Garda Siochana." Yet every one of the Supreme Court judges have agreed that Marie Murray should be retried for Capital Murder. They have made a start towards the Murrays central demand for a recentral demand for a re Yet the contempt of court cases are still pend-

ing against Hibernia and the Association for Legal Justice for daring to critic-ise the Special Criminal

Meeting of An Comhairle Cuige, Uladh (Ulster Executive) took place on Sunday 12th December, 1976 in Monaghan, the new officer board being duly elected. The following statement is issued from tne new body:

"On the 1st March 1976, Merlyn Rees removed Merlyn Rees removed 'political prisoner status.' He further qualified this removal by declaring that this would affect those prisoners convicted offences committed on or after the 1st March, 1976.

Those convicted of offences committed up to 29th February are not affected by the removal of this status. This has since status. This has since been compromised by the

fact that a rider charge of membership of the IRA has been applied to some prisoners after this date. This is all part and parcel of the double-think, divide of the double-think, divide and conquer policy of the British Government. It is part of the Kitsonian type undermining tactics in that the British are attempting to destroy the tremendous morale among imprisoned Republicans, by setting one section of prisoner against the other within the prison system. Those prisoners who will be affected by this removal will be forced into prisons cells, forced to wear prison garb, forced to do penal servitude.

"We will resist, and are resisting this type of jackresisting this type booting of our prisoners. We are now assuring the Government that they are in for a long, hot series of protests from Sinn Fein on the issue of political status. THE 'NON-POLITICAL' POLITICAL PRISONERS

A few weeks ago two oung Derry Republicans were sentenced by a Diplock Special Court to years imprisonment Their each. "offences were possessing weapons and being members of the IRA. Because their charges related to an incident after March 1st, the deadline set by Merlyn Rees while he was Secre-tary of State for the 6 counties for the ending of Political Status, these two men knew that they were going to be denied 'Special category.' In forthright and determined statements from the dock they informed the 'court' that they were, regardless of what the British said, political prisoners, and as such they intended refusing to wear prison garb and do prison

a result of their decision they joined the other Republican POWs who because of their insistence on being treated as political prisoners and not criminals are being kept at this moment in solitary confinement, naked except for a blanket.

We in this end of the camp have witnessed since the first man Kiernan Nugent was sent to the cells, a definite hardening in the attitude of both the prison administration and prison staff.

Not only have we been subjected to increase narassment on visits and during searches but the prison administration have increased been deliberately slow to espond in carrying out vitally necessary repairs to nuts which presently acco-modate men but which a recent news paper article revealed that under the EEC statutory require-EEC statutory require-ments farm animals ments farm animals would not be allowed to be kept in. In a report published 3 weeks ago the N.I.O. claimed to be spending £14 million this year alone on prisons; where I would like to ask is this money going? because here in Long Kesh it would appear that they cannot afford to buy half a dozen panes of glass.

Conditions however in the H-Blocks where our com-rades captured after the 1st of March are being kept are infinitely worse

greatly. Once a prisoner arrives in that area and refused to wear criminal clothes he is stripped naked and locked in a single cell

As a result of his refusal to behave like a criminal, prison officers continually harass him, the food is inedible, cold or cient in quantity, insufficient in quantity, the heating is turned up full and then off in order to create the maximum discomfort, his visits, letters etc., are stopped, and to all intents and purposes he is completely

Over recent days we have received reliable information about an increase repression in the H-ock. This repression which is occuring in many ways but in particular through physical abuse, has been born of an increasing desperation on the part of the N.I.O. break the resistance these Republicans. numbers of men on protest are increasing daily as more men pass through the Special courts; at the time of writing this article 26 Republicans are being held in H1 and H2 and there are in the region of 200 more awaiting 'British Justice.' In Armagh, 2 girls are now on protest action and as with the men action and as with the filer there are many others awaiting 'trial.' For the British to successfully tag our comrades with the our comrades with the label 'criminal' they must do so now while the numbers are still small enough for them to retain reasonable control of the situation. Repression therefore is the order of the day.

TEN MONTH OLD BABY ARRESTED BY BRITS IN CITY

Raids arrests and harassment continue to increase in the New Lodge area. Almost everyone walking along the Street are stopped and checked by the British Army. Within the past week 30 arrests have been reported to the Sinn Fein Centre. Most of these have been held for up to four hours supposedly for 'screening' but in some cases they were held in Crumlin Road Interrogation Centre for three days. Two young girls from the area are girls from the area are constantly being harassed by the Brits. These two girls have been arrested five times in the last few months and are stopped and cheeked almost every Centre night. On Saturday afternoon the two girls were in the town shopping. They had a neighbours 10 had months old baby with them in a pram. In Castle Street were stopped and ed. The baby was arrested. also taken with them to the Grand Central. They were released about an hour later and the Brit Officer informed the baby's mother that they hadn't realised that the baby was also in custody.

A Brit Army foot patrol attempted to arrest Sinn Fein member arrest Wednesday night. The man was walking towards the

Centre when he was accosted by the Brits. They asked him to step into the entry until they checked him out. He refused and walked into the Centre. The Brits attempted to come into the Centre after him but were received by one of when were prevented by one of the female members. The Brits then remained outside for about half an hour waiting for the man to come out. Local men and women came out from the women came out from the nearby clubs and the Centre was packed with people. It was only then that the Brits moved off. Government does not pay out unless guilt is proven. That these men were tortured and injured during RUC interrogation is therefore beyond doubt. It is not reasonable now to expect the torturers to be charged and tried for these crimes, or will this case like so many countcase like so many count-less others be swept under the carpet as a necessary act of war. The British Government have been found guilty of 'ill-treat-ment' of arrested persons at the Court of Human Rights at Strasbourg and the innocent victims of this 'ill-treatment' have been compensated finanthis 'ill-treatment' have been compensated financially by the British, but what of the perpetrators of the ill-treatment, what of the criminals whose action caused the British Exchequer to pay out large exchequer to pay out large sums of money. When can we expect action to be taken against the RUC and British Army for their crimes against the Irish people?

Some 9,000 complaints have been lodged against the RUC and British Army in the past 7 years, yet not one actual conviction has been secured. However, it must be considered that such complaints are investigated by the RUC and their partiality must be questioned
