Heath concedes nothing to S.D.L.P. except scones

The much vaunted, much talked of S.D.L.P.— Heath meeting yielded nothing except scones and jam from the British Prime Minister last week. After a two hour session Heath had nothing conceded except a few scones, jam and a shake hands as well as a small pen for John Hume. The overall result of the meeting was nothing gained. Why then did the news media, particularly RTE seek to cloud the truth in a welter of verbiage? Why did RTE try to mislead the public into believing that something had in fact been achieved?

The explanation lies in the fact that Dublin politicians have guilty consciences resulting from their betrayal of the Northern campaign. They know they have let the people down. Lynch knows that he has collaborated on numerous occasions with the British Government and British army in conducting a campaign of terror against the anti-Unionist population. He knows that he and others co-operated in the "Motorman" operation when Whitelaw smashed down the barricades of freedom and ploughed his fifty-ton tankers into the Bogside and Creggan. He further knows that the Republican Movement have massive popular sup-

port, that the SDLP who have stood idly by with Lynch, have lost credibility with the people. Lynch can see the political gyrations of Hume and Co. Few will forget or forgive their exploitation of the stage-managed deaths of five civilians, 2 soldiers and 2 UDA men on 21st July in order to issue a statement saying that they were going to see Whitelaw. The fact that they had to withdraw from this is a reflection not on the SDLP's loyalty to the internees but rather their fear of the. people who have supported the anti-Internment demonstrations so loyally and courageously. The men whom Lynch has identified with are clearly seen to have no support among the anti-Unionist community in the North. They



have been clearly seen to have been kicked around by the Republican Movement and other radical forces during the past 12 months. They were clearly kicked out of Stormont by the Republican Move ment. They were not allowed to return to Stormont by the wrath of the people which followed internment and by the great civil resistance campaign of which the Republican campaign was its dynamic. They were shamed into breaking the ban on marches by the Northern Resistance Movement and its leaders. Austin Currie although he had the arrogance to speak did not take part in the first banned march which he attended on January 2. John Hume, Currie, Fitt, O'Hanlon or Paddy Devlin were not on the Bloody Sunday march. Ivan Cooper broke his Party's rules by being present. Lynch has therefore clearly lined up with men of like mind and temperment, with men who did not play their part in this cam-

Lynch in order to save himself must try to boost the stock of his collaborators. He must use all the weapons at his command into bullying the people of the anti-Unionist community of the North into believing that the SDLP speak for them. In fact, they

speak for 7% of the Northern population as recorded at the last general election. Lynch's efforts to use the media — especially RTE to beat the Republican Movement and boost the SDLP has been a dismal failure. Republicans have made mistakes as any organisation must do. The efforts of Lynch, and SDLP to exploit their mistakes have exploded in their own faces. The community at large can see that unlike Lynch and the



SDLP the IRA are a band of selfless men and women, prepared to risk everything, life and limb, to liberate a down-trodden people. No suffering has been too excruciating, no exploit too dangerous, no sacrifice too great for these men to make for the cause of freedom which they serve. Many of them have made the Supreme

Sacrifice. Their sufferings and sacrifices will not be in vain. In the words of Pearse:

"They shall be spoken of among their people,

The generations shall remember them,

And call them blessed."

Oliver Plunkett Rountree, Colm Murtagh, Ann Parker, Dorothy Maguire were all "faithful and they fought."

Lynch and his collaborators who were so yellow and traitorous will be despised by future generations as the men who tried to sabotage the fight for Irish freedom, the men who put their own selfish positions before the good of their country and especially the plight of their fellow down-trodden Irishmen in the Six Counties. Future generations of Irishmen will disown all those who have collaborated with the enemy during

Well, well, well, what do you know, the English too had a plan for a guerrilla force on standby lest she lost the last war with Germany. Stockpiles of weapons and men were set aside for this very important task, the off-chance that Britain may have fallen under the might of the Third Reich.

#### GUN CRAZY LOUTS

Once again we have to report on the brutal excesses of the Royal Green Jackets in the Clonard Area. Over the weekend this regiment ran amok, Many of the duck patrols were seen to stagger about in a drunken state. They threw empty beer cans at the local people as they patrolled in a saracen. Now that they are more familiar with the area they race round in their Saladin armoured tanks at top speed.

On Saturday they lifted for screening purposes every man they could find. One 16 year old was lifted twice in 24 hours and taken to the North Howard Street billet. On Sunday afternoon they arrested a young girl and took her and her mother to Springfield Road barracks. Two young boys, aged 14 were arrested and charged with riotous behaviour WOMEN WHO TRIED TO INTERVENE TO ASSISTHE YOUTHS WERE SPRAYED WITH GAS BY A POLICEWOMAN WHO WAS CONCEALED IN THE SARACEN. It is not the first time that a policewoman has visisted that a policewoman has visited the Clonard area in the back of a Saracen. Another young man, an ex-internee was lifted on Sunday afternoon and taken to Castlereagh Station. This was his second spell of interrogation, the previous one lasting 57 hours.

## Britain's Ghost Regiment

"With such a background of involvement in guerrilla wars in other lands the outright denial of SAS activity in Northern Ireland seems surprising.

If SAS men are not operating here then this would mean a major departure from accepted British military tactics".

So ran the interesting article on the Faceless Battalion called the SAS in this weeks SUNDAY NEWS. This article reiterated the view carried by Republicans for over two years the SAS are indeed an active unit in the six counties.

The article also revealed the many activities of the SAS in other lands: "Later in the troubles in Kenya, SAS officers working in pairs, blackened their bodies and led 'pseudo-gangs' of Africans to counter-terror raids". Could the same not be true of the eix counties.

The article pointed out the fact that the IRA know of the existence of this 'ghost troop' in the North.

"And the incident which sparked off the recent controversy about an alleged SAS patrol in the Bawnmore Estate on Belfasts Shore Road still remains something of a mystery. When a civilian car was stopped in the estate by vigilantes two of the men in it spoke with English accents and claimed to be members of the security forces, but refused to produce proof of this. A third man in the back seat was pulled out of the car and was found to be carrying an Army issue Browning automatic in a shoulder holster.

The vigilantes then tried to get the other men from the car, but a shot was fired from the vehicle which sped off. Before the men of 40 Marine Commando arrived on the scene to take the remaining man away, it is claimed that he sat on the edge of the pavement, gave his name and said he was a member of the SAS.

We would concur with the view of the SUNDAY NEWS reporter that "it is incidents like this which add to the rumours of yet another undercover army being at work in Ulster today".

## NO PEACE WITHOU Patrick H. Pearse

We owe to our country all fealty, and she asks always for our service; and there are times when she asks of us not ordinary but some supreme sacrifice. There are in every generation those who shrink from the ultimate sacrifice but there are in every generation those who make it with joy and laughter, and these are the salt of our generations, heroes who stand midway between God and Men.

Patriotism is in large part a memory of heroic dead men and a striving to accomplish some task left unfinished by them. Had they not gone before, made their attempts, suffered the sorrow of their failures, we should ong ago have lost fhe tradition of faith and service, having no memory in the heart, nor any unaccomplished dream.

The generation that is now growing old in Ireland had almost forgotten our heroes. We had learned the

great art of parleying with our enemy and of achieving nationhood by even negotiation. The heroes had trodden hard and bloody ways we should tread soft and flowery ways. The heroes had given up all things; we had learned a way of gaining all things - land and good living and the friendship of our foe. But the soil of Ireland, yea the very stones of our cities have cried out against our infidelity that would barter an old tradition of nationhood even for a thing so precious as PEACE.

This the heroes have done for us; for their spirits dwell in the places where they lived and the hills of Ireland must be rent and the cities levelled to the ground, and all her children driven out upon the seas of the world, and this before those voices are silenced that bid us be faithful still and make no PEACE with England until IRELAND IS OURS.



In view of the efforts of the British Army and her helpers to coerce the people of the six counties into the acceptence of an imposed solution, the following points should be remembered. With the negative success of Operation Motorman and the failure of the British to achieve any sort of peace from their callous intimidation and brutality we asked ourselves what next? The spate of arrests, accompanied with the inevitable brutality, the further detentions, again reiterated on TV as the way out for Whitelaw, he has interned no one, all point in one direction, very soon, if it has already been put into operation, the Heath/ Whitelaw/Lynch solution for the Irish race will take place.

Everything has been tried by Whitelaw, he now hints that the British people are fed up subsidising this part of our island, and one has to agree that 300, million pounds per year is a lot of loot. that is everything except the obvious. of this land want or need their The one force that has caused this situation to come about, the one set of people who can quarantee peace, the only organisation with enough political forethought to plan for the whole island as a Nation, these are the people that have been ignored. We refer, of course, to the Republican

Movement. The fact that they have in the past six months called two ceasefires from their supporters and Volunteers and made them work is ample proof of the control that is exercised by the leadership of the Movement. The last truce, a bilateral one, was broken by the British Army at the behest of the UDA who found probably that peace did not suit them at all, a fact encouraged by the assassinations The time has come for all that took place since the beginning of the truce. There was no reason why the truce should have gone at Lenadoon, no reason at all.

The British Army were 'in control' of the area and should have insisted on the right to put those unfortunate people in the homes given them by the Housing Executive, instead of accepting UDA pressure and backing down to their demands, which incidentally, have proved worthless as the Protestant people have moved out of South Lenadoon anyway, a fact not given too much coverage these days. The point here is to

prove that the Republicans were right, their demands that the people be housed, even it if took a little time to prove that they were right in their assumption that the Protestants were going to use the situation to move out anyway. The Army of the People is still there intact, and obviously intent on carrying on the war, the only way the war can be stopped is by direct talks with the representatives of the Movement and by an agreed guaranteed truce, pending more talks for an immediate and definite settlement of the problems. Republicans are not two-headed monsters, as some would have the people believe, they are dedicated Irish people dedicated to seeking the unconditional freedom of their people, whatever the price be that they have to pay.

It may well be that some people cannot understand this dedication probably because it has not crossed their minds that the people freedom, but it must be obvious after the events of the past four years that all is not well with the minority of the people of this area. Bearing in mind that the leadership of the Republican Movement can have only one aim, that being the setting up of a Socialist Democratic Republic of 32 counties, it is amazing that there has been so little discussion along these lines from any of those who claim to speak for members of the minority.

The fallacy of the SDLPs talks with Heath must surely be a firm indication that the British Government do not want to hear anything that does not coincide with their already formulated plans for us.

members of the community to seriously study the prospects of a future in Ireland, a future fraught with strife, of a future welcoming an effort by all our people to re-establish the way of life so badly wanted and needed by all of us. We here in Long Kesh are as eager for a solution as anyone else, maybe more so, but an imposed solution will not work, will not be acceptable to most and will only by its creation sow the seeds for further revolution and trouble for our country, a country which has already suffered

creed or faith; eve have no objections to the freedoms we all so earnestly desire, freedom of speech, freedom of the press. freedom to lead our lives as we see fit within the laws of a just, fair and democratic society We see no sense in giving up the struggle when none of these things have been achieved, and it would be foolish of anyone to suppose that we are otherwise. The creation of the type of society we seek is amplified by our programme, EIRE NUA, the New Ireland, and in it are set down the ideas for the new society we envisage within the programme. It is only a pool of our ideas, quite open to discussion and if necessary amandment, but it is concrete, the suggestion that we are politically bankrupt goes to the wall when one reads these suggestions from us; when one considers that we have already dropped from our war, various points that we found or thought we found would not be acceptable under any circumstances to certain of the Irish peoples.

We have proved by the truces. that we can control he war, that we are prepared to listen, who listened harder than we at Lenadoon? What did we achieve from all that listening? Nothing, only a step back into the endless grind of war.

Our people are fed up with war, we know that, no-one likes war, we do not like fighting that deprives of our freedom and our normal way of life. But the war must go on until sense is seen by the invader and those who support him. The minority have had all they are going to take. There will be no more acceptance, as an every day thing, of discrimination, of oppression, of bigotted rule, or of anything which is not totally fair to one and all. It is not up for speculation what way the war may go, only the facts, hard as they are to accept that the war will go on until someone listens to what we, as spokesmen for the minority, demand.

There is no future in talking around any point, better by far to say what you have to say so that all will know what it is you want. The aims of Oglaigh na h-Eireann are pretty straightforward as we have

already said. The ideas formulated and now printed in the booklet, EIRE NUA, are all part of the policy of the Provisional Government of the Irish Republic. We realise that we cannot have all we want, we are prepared to negotiate on each and every point, as long as there is a future in entering those talks. We are sick to death of hearing about the callous leadership which seems to be pitiless, What a fallacy. Our present leadership is the strongest and best supported, we in the movement have ever had. They have proved that they are capable of directing this war, funny thing is the British and their hirelings have been much more brutal and have been seen to be so (thanks to TV and unbiased reporting). We are not backing down on anything that any Republican holds dear, we are not by nature a callous or indifferent people, we are not a vengeful people, witness the refusal to engage in sectarian warfare despite the weight of the assassinations on our people. In the final analysis, it is to be hoped, because hope springs eternal that the powers that be in their wisdom will soon see their way clear to open negotiations with the leadership because any talks that take place without our representatives are boudn to be fruitless, simply because they would not have our point of view, and it has already been decided that all points of view must be heard. Heath and Whitelaw would appear to be the men in the middle, the men that hold the nay and year of it all. It is up to them, if, as they say, they re interested in solving this problem once and for all. At 300 millions per year it is essential.

With the advent of the EEC it is absolutely essential. We want peace with justice, England must guarantee peace with justice. Unionism must accept that their reign is over, they did not do too badly for themselves, and understand that peace with justice is a guarantee for them too. The world in general is in the best position to see if our demands are unfair or uncalled for. Let us be at it, think of all the enrgy and power that is directed at the war effort, imagine that same energy and power directed to the creation of an EIRE NUA, a new Ireland, fit for all persons to live in freedom from oppression, war, bigotry - an Ireland worthy of the race who live

# FRUSTRATION

A categoric 'no' was Whitelaw's answer to lan Paisley's demand for a public and impartial inquiry into the killing of two loy. list men on the Shankill Road recently. Paisley's threat that if he sid not get his inquiry, he would sithdraw from the 'conference' did not deter the Whitelaw decision. Still the answer was 'no'.

The frustration of this situation is not a new thought to the Nationalist population. Many, many of our people have been killed by British soldiers under highly questionable circumstance, but we never got an inquiry.

Seamus Cusack and Desmond Beattie, two young Derry men were murdered in the Bogside, and against a wave of public feeling, including the withdrawal from Stormont of the minority MPs, the British refused an inquiry. Only an inquest months later went some way to vindicating these young men. Three young boys from Newry were gunned down walking along the street eating chips. Post mortem revealed that undigested chips

were still in the mouths of these lads. Still there was no inquiry and we had to suffer the indignity of slander that these three young men were IRA men.

Let there be no doubt that only the magnitude of the slaughter on the streets of Derry on the 30th January 1972; only the fact that the TV media of many countries revealed the terrible truth of that day of carnage, did we get the ill-fated Widgery inquiry (and what good did that do us). Ian Paisley would do himself a favour in examining the following reports: SCARMAN, COMPTON, WIDGERY, and WHITELAW, only then will he really see that an inquiry into the killing of these two Protestants would only serve as a vindication of the Paratroopers.

## PRESS RELEASE

On September the 14th, a Press Conference was held in a downtown hotel by Sinn Fein.

Mr. Eamon Caughey, chairman, Belfast Co-Ordnating Committee, opened the conference and referred to the British denials of brutality towards Remand Prisoners as "vicious lies' concocted to save Whitelaw's face. He called for the abolition of the Military and RUC guard on prisoners who were being transported to Hillsborough Court house and their replacement by Prison Officers.

Evidence was given to members of the press by female relatives of some of the men held in The Maze Prison and afterwards answered questions put to them by reporters. One lady, Mrs. E. Higgins was visibly upset during the recounting of the happenings at the Mize. At one stage during her evidence she bared her arms to show bruises she personally receivedat the hands of an RUC constable. There were approximately twelve ladies present and there were twice that number of Press and TV representatives.

A statement was read by Mr. Caughey which had been received that morning from the OC of the internees, Mr. Liam Hannaway, in which he described the events within the prison, as witnessed by him. The ladies then produced various articles, including two guitars and a transistor radio, which had been sent out from the prison after the cowardly attack on the defenceless 'remands'. The guitars were broken in several places and the radio bore the unmistakable imprint of a rifle butt on its twisted cover. It is hoped that the wide coverage which the Conference received in the daily papers will be instrumental in ending this type of behaviour by the enemy.

Canada, without being conscious of the fact, is passing through the greatest crisis in its history. This is the opinion of a Canadian Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism in a report published in October, 1967.

The census of 1961 in Canada reveals the cause of the crisis. It showed that over ten-and-a-half million Canadians spoke English, over five million spoke French and the remaining two-and-a-half million spoke German, Italian, Ukrainian, Dutch, Polish, Scandinavian, Yiddish, Indian and Eskimo.

When the English won Canada 100 years ago the French population numbered 65,000. Since then the French have multiplied, filled Quebec province and spilled over into neighbouring provinces. After the English conquest attempts were made to suppress the French language, but it was not long until bilinqualism was accepted in courts and public life in the French-speaking areas. However, up to the present day there have been many instances of discrimination against French, particularly in areas where French speakers have less than a majority. This is the direct cause of the present crisis.

It is only in Quebec Province that the language of instruction in the schools coincides with the mother tongues of the children. Two separate school systems have been built up, for Catholic (French) and Protestant (English) children. Outside Quebec, Manitoba is the sole province where French may be used as a language of instruction. There, specific permission must be obtained and instruction in French is limited to half the school day.

The vitality of the French-speaking community in Canada is apparent from the fact that it has maintained its position at about thirty per cent of the population for the past eighty years. This has been so despite the heavy immigration into Englishspeaking Canada and the absence of transfusions into French Quebec.

The Canadian language situation can best be described by an account of the work and conclusions of the Royal Commission, Growth of the Quebec Separatist movement led to the setting up of the Commission in 1963. It immediately set about a task for which there were few precedents - acquiring factual information on the problems of lang- revealed "the wholly inadequate way then we must conclude that the

uage and culture.

The members of the Commission met many thousands of Canadians at regional meetings in fourteen public sessions each lasting up to four days. Four hundred submissions were received from organisations and individuals. University professors and special experts were employed to supply one hundred and fifty research reports. These included detailed studies of the language situation in Finland, Switzerland, Belguim and South Africa.

A study was carried out among seven large firms and 794 small firms divided between the English and French-speaking communities in Quebec and Montreal. It showed, the report said, that "The differences in viewpoint between the two language groups were significent."

Eleven research reports on Canadian press and television included a content analysis and comparison of the handling of news by English and French language newspapers. Referring to the present crises the Commission's report said: "It is a time when decisions must be taken and developments must occur lead ing either to Canada's breaking up or to a new set of conditions for future existence."

The Commission inquired in depth into the connection between language and culture and said: "The life of the two cultures (English and French) implies in principle the life of the two languages. Later when we deal with the idea of equality we shall see that at the practical level an attempt to make every provision for cultural equality is primarily an attempt to make every provision for linguistic equality.'

On the question of the country's economic life the report says that not only must individual English speakers and French speakers feel that there are no linguistic or cultural barriers to their progress at commerce or industry, but they must also feel that as a linguistic and cultural group they share in the direction of economic life.

"Language is the main instrument of social consciousness" it said. "It is chiefly because they don't share the same language that they don't belong to the same cultural group."

The Commission said that its survey of language rights in Canada

It decided to take as a guiding principle the recognition of both official languages in law and in practice, wherever the minority is numerous enough to be visable as a group. It suggested the minority was visable when it reached ten per cent of the population of a particul the real stumbling block has been ar district. It said: "Living in French the unwillingness of the Englishmust be made possible in every part of Canada where there are enough French-speaking peole."

The Commission recommended that English and French be formally declared the official languages of the Parliament of Canada, of the Federal courts, of the Federal Government and of the Federal Administration.

Giving its reasons it asserted: "If we add up the number of times a citizen must use language when dealing with the various agencies of government - if we consider the decisive role language plays in the schools, if we think of the mass media controlled by the State -

The report suggest language practices at Federal and provincial level throughout Canada. It said its aim was to encourage an active co-oper ation among all provincial governments in providing services to the regional minority in its own langu

In its recommendations on education the Commission's report says speaking majority to recognize the right of French-speaking parents to educate their children in French It recommends that the right of Canadians to have their children educated in the official language of their choice be recognised . In the officially bilingual provinces there would be parallel school systems for English and Frenchspeaking children.

In an obvious reference to the main tenence of Canadian unity the report concluded with this remark: "We are convinced that it is import ant for Canada to maintain strong and vigorous links in the chain of French language and culture across the whole country."

### IRISH REPUBLICAN PUBLICITY BUREAU

We have been asked to release the following statement.....

(1) The hunger-strike by Republican prisoners in the Currant Military Detention Camp continues. as 11 prisoners enter their 7th day of refusing food.

Due to the fact that the 26-County Government have reneged on its promise to accord full political status to the prisoners, it has been found necessary by the prisoners to commence again a hunger strike in order to be accorded, after all, what was accorded to the Republican prisoners in Crumlin Road Prison Belfast, by the British Government, vis. political prisoner status. Details of the demands of the prisoners have already been issued in a previous statement released on the 15th September.

The living conditions of the prisoners in the Curragh are atrocious. The prison is in a filty state, with garbage and rotten food posing a grave health hazard. The prison authorities have refused to provide clean delph or cutlery for each meal, and any food that is eaton by those not on hunger-strike is eaten from cardboard, tins, bottles, jam-jars and bare hands

Again it must be pointed out that the agreement entered into with the prisoners by the 26 County Government has been broken by the latter, who must bear full responsibility for the consequences

(2) The conditions existing in Mountjoy prison re: remand prisoners are very bad and a protest was staged within the prison to bring attention to bear on these conditions. The prisoners barricaded themselves into three cells. Steel-helmeted and batoncarrying Gardai were called in but the prisoners refused to take down the barricades.

The doors were subsequently taken down and some of the prisoners were brutally ill-treated kicked, batoned and dragged by their hair across the compound. The prisoners involved were then taken to the punishment cells and put on bread and water punishment diet for a fortnight.
