After weeks of in-tolerable harassments, and British Army offensives against the Irish Resistance in the Six-Counties, and high-level incursions by the sectarian para-military RUC into Republican and nationalist areas, follow-ing the loyalist strike, the People and the Irish Republican Army have once again stood up to and faced the Repression. And the People and the Irish Republican Army have once again won.

Last Thursday Volunteers of the East
Tyrone Command patiently lay in wait for
at least 12 hours at
Carnan Crossroads. An
RUC patrol, representing British law in a
Republican area, turned
into the district. The into the district. The Volunteers opened fire with Armalite and AK47 with Armalite and AK47
rifles, killing three RUC
men. They escaped into
the local terrain with
which they are famlilar and among the
sympathetic population.
It is well known that
rural querilla units of

rural guerilla units of the IRA lie out for days waiting for Brit-ish Army and RUC incursions, particularly in border areas. It is this determination and constant vigilance which gives republicans con-trol of many areas.

On Tuesday Volunt-eers of the Belfast

Brigade took up ambush positions beside Andérsonstown RUC barracks, so close to the billet that the British Army/ RUC looked ridiculous. After an overnight wait the Volunteers sighted a plain-clothes RUC patrol which they att-acked, seriously injur-ing one of the occupants.

The RUC have been The HUC have been heavily relying on the British Army for softening up Republican ghetto areas; but the British Army hasn't had an easy time of it either! it either!

On Monday afternoon British Army patrol

stopped in the ingtree Road (near

Divis Flats, Belfast) to read a newly erected poster on the blocked-up window of a dere-lict house. About the second sentence the poster blew up (commposter blew up (command-detonated by IRA Volunteers) and, as our photograph shows, the British Army in their statement that "a sold-ler suffered slight shock" were blatantly

lying. In Ballymurphy on Tuesday afternoon a sniper hit a soldier and eye witnesses stated that he was seriously in-jured. In Turf Lodge on Tuesday night two soldiers were blown up by a strategically placed landmine. The explosion was heard in the far-side of the city and again we had an immediate British Army statement of "slight in-juries" received.

Heavy Brit reinforcements were rushed to the scene and local people mobilised against the large-scale invasion. Militant mothers and youths who took to the streets harassed the Brits and sent a few to hospital.

The Brits have also ome under gun-attacks in Derry City, Strabane, and twice in South Armagh last week. The Belfast Brigade IRA also carried out a number of bomb attacks. Strathgrey in Cayabili Road of bomb attacks. Strath-more Inn, Cavehill Road, which was a popular haunt of the RUC Special Branch was wrecked in an attack on Tuesday. The Republican peo-ple can take heart hat the rehelling against

the rebellion against British Imperialist occupation is gaining momentum on a scale the height of which hasn't been matched for several years.

The confidence prestige inspired by the military successes must now be transformed into mass street mob-llisations of the People in supprt of P.O.W. status for our prisoners

Beechmount bombing

Despite the fact that a Shankill Road UDA man, Edward Leckey of Battenbern Street, has been charged with the murder of 10-year-old Kevin McMenamin in Beechmount Avenue on Easter Sunday, the Republican Clube have refused to retract their accusation that the Irish Republican Army bombed them.

It was the Sticke lack of political acumen to see the significance of the timing of the bombing which precipitated a feud situation in Belfast last April. Following the Sticks shot two civillans at the gate of Milltown Cemetry, which they later denied. They have shown themselves completely negative, counter-revolutionary and totally irresponsible.

DERRY OPPOSES JUBILEE

In order to celebrate the Queen's diamond jubilee anniversary all schools in Derry were ordered to close down for the day. This was reinforced by a statement from D.E.S. stating that the holiday would be "non-transferable" attempting to that totransferable", attempting to ensure that Irish People would be forced to bend their knee

to the English queen.

Although "officially" closed some school remained open as a protest against the dictatorial attitude of the british officials. As a show of solidarity with this protest all schools in the Republican areas of Derry were picketed by Sinn Fein and members of the Irish Front.

supported this action against
"psychological" imperialism in
forcing teachers, children and
parents to celebrate 25 years
of torture, intimidation

PORTLAOISE PRISON

AN ANSWER TO Mr. COONEY

The Minister for justice, Cooney, T.D. refused an public inquiry into con-ditions in Port Laoise public Inquir, ditions in Port Laoise Prison. Many individuals and organisations, including Amnesty inter-national have called for

national have called for such an inquiry.

During the recent hunger strike the Minister, in his statement of March 28, 1977, which he issued to members of the Dali and Senate, City, County and Urban District Councilors, and national and local newspapers estated. local newspapers, stated that allegations about conditions in Port Laoise were totally false and without any foundation whatever

in order to highlight the need for an Indep-endent public inquiry we believe it necessary to deal in some detail with this particular Minsterial statement.

STRIP SEARCHING

In his statement of March 28th, the Minister stated "Firstly it has been alleged that in strip searching the prisoner's anus is probed with an instrument. This is untrue. Instruments are not used'

It should be noted that the Minister does not deny that the prisoner's anus is probed by warders dur-

ing strip searches.
We are not aware of any allegations that an instru-ment was used. The Min-ister stated that such an allegation was made last July. Last July Councillor Joe O'Neill, in a signed statement, stated that the warders made him bend over and pulled "my buttocks apart with their bare hands so that they pare nands so that they could inspect my anus'.
Councillor O'Neill did not allege that an instrument was used. Fr. In the same statement of March 28th, 1977, the Minister stated that in addition to periodic strip searches, the pris-oners were searched before and after visits to Court, and after visits to court, to the hospital and before and after legal visits. However in his statement of February 2, 1977 the Minister stated "occasionally it may heppen that a particular prisoner may be required to undergo two

or even three strip searches in a short space would suggest that It is unlikely that any one prisoner would visit the Court, the hospital and have a legal visit all in "a short space of time". Therefore it is not unrea-

sonable to suggest that there are other occasions. not mentioned by the Minister, when the pris-oners are strip searched. It is our information that all the prisoners are strip searched on at least one morning per week; every evening prisoners

period of solitary confinement, a prisoner owed no commu owed communication with the other prisoners, he is allowed no letters, no visits, no newspapers no radio, no hobby or hand craft material. He is con-fined to his cell for 23 hours-during the period of exercise he must walk alone in the exercise yard. When in solitary confinement the prisoner's shoes are taken from him.

EDUCATIONAL

ILITIES: The Minister In statement of March 28th ommitted any reference to educational facilities.

There are no educational facilities provided nor are the prisoners permitted to supply their own. Perhaps this explains the Minister's ommission.

VISITS:

A prisoner is allowed one visit of 20 minutes per week. In order to obtain a visit to a son or husband, a wife or mother must write to the Gov-ernor. A passport pres-ented at the jall is not accepted as proof of identity. It has taken two or three weeks in some cases for the Governor to delay allow a visit-this would occur during the pr-

through the wire and children carmot recognise their fathers and become frightened by the caged appearance of the room. Two warders supervise the visit and one warder records the conversation. If any mention of con-ditions in the prison is made the visit is ended.

One visit was stopped because the mother spoke in Irish. Other v have been stopped, for example, one woman said to her husband "you look to her husband "you look pale, are you getting any exercise?" and the warder said they were talking about conditions; another man told his wife that he had been beaten and the visit was stopped. had bec Regularly the warder accuses either the visitor or the prisoner of not speakloud enough or ing speaking about prison conditions. Visitors are in constant dread of not only causing their visit to be causing tneir visit to be ended abruptly but of causing their husband or son to be deprived of further visits for a month or more; or as happened in three cases of which we are aware, the visitor has had permission to visit husband and son withdrawn by the Governor

The Minister statement of March 28th did not refer to the above details of a visit to Port Laoise Prison.

In conclusion it is worthy of note that in February this year when the Irish this year when the rish Times reported allegations of police brutality against members of the Gardai investigation squads, the same Minister in an RTE Television interview claimed that a consultation with the Garda Commissioner, Mr. Garvey about these allegations was not necessary because such comp-laints were beyond comprehension.

March the same Minister, when dealing with allegations of irregularities in fingerprint evidence, reported by the Irish Times stated, in reply to a Dail question, that after the in-conclusive identification of a fingerprint in British Ambassa Ambassador's more definite case no information was given to his Department.

The Minister now says that there is nothing to inquire into in Port Laoise Prison.

We submit that conditions in Port Laoise Prison warrant an indep endent public inquiry and that any analysis of the content of the Minthat of ister's statement of March 28th, its ommisions and a comparison with the Minister's previous statement of February 2nd, serve to highlight the urgent need for an independent public inquiry.

In his statement of March 28, the Minister stated that men being kept stated that men being kept apart from the general body of prisoners "are locked in their cells save for recreation". It should be noted that in this statement the Minister refers to outdoor exercise as "recreation". In fact prisoners are allowed no period of indoor recreation during a period of solitary confinement During a

stated that prisoners have stated that prisoners have outdoor recreation with facilities to play football, volleyball and handball. He omitted to say that the outdoor recreation is confined to a small tarmacadamed exercise yard-the exercise to the two the smallest of the two exercise yards in the prison. He omitted to say that 60/70 prisoners are required to exercise this space at the same time, that only about 14 men can play football and 5 handball while the other prisoners look and that much of the time, in order to allow all the prisonto allow all the prison-ers to exercise, no football can be played especially in the cold winter months.

INDOOR RECREATION.

In his statement of March 28th, the Minister stated "at Indoor recreation they can play cards, chess, draughts, table tennis, watch television and have four pool tables". The Minister ommitted to say that the recreation approximately room is approximately 15ft. x 45ft. and that 60/70 prisoners use the room at the same time. Television viewing is available from 6.00p.m. to to 7.00 p.m. which, save for

isoner's remand period and therefore while on remand he may be in receipt of no visits. While a waiting room is provided the visitors-women and children, young and old-are kept waiting outside the gates of the prison standing in rain and cold, never sure whether in feet never sure whether in fact they will get a visit.

They may be called within an hour or two. They may have to wait through lunchtime from 12 noon to 2.00 p.m. or risk losing their place and thus forfeit their chance of a visit after lunch. When visit after lunch. When finally called they are searched in a caravan before being allowed into the waiting room. They are searched before again being allowed through being anowed through the visiting box. The visiting box is approximately 18 ft. long but only one prisoner and his visitor/s is permitted. The prisoner is permitted. and visitor are separated by a black double wire grille, lined on both sides from table level. No physical contact of any description can take place; it is difficult with perspex rising

During the period of the last week a Republican prisoner was sentenced to 18 years for the alleged possession of documents, while loyalists have received lesser sentences for some of the most have received lesser sent-ences for some of the most sadistic murders. This indicates that not only are the Diplock Courts glorified sentencing trib-unals, but also that it is still the case that there is one scale of law for Loyalists, and another for Republicas

So tar ne nas re-cruited over 250 Americans mostly US Army rejects from Vietnam, as well as assorted Greeks, Portuguese, Australians and Brits. The American Government, while officially deploring Americans going as volunteers to fight for the facist Rhodesians have done nothing to stop the trade, which is openly organised by Lt.Col. Robert K.Brown, ex-Special Force 'A' Team Leader in Vietnam. He edits 'Soldier Fortune,' the best known mercenary paper and still has very close links with the military, indeed there is evidence that some mercenaries that some mercenaries bound for Rhodesia have been trained at a Marine Corps base in Quantico, Virginia, Moreover, American officers and men from special forces units from special rorces units have been given indefinite leave and special training in Fort Benning, Georgia prior to mercenary work, first in Angola and then, after their rout there, along with Callan and his murderous clowns, in Rhodesia.

The figures best known for recruiting mercenaries in Britain are Leslie Aspin and John Banks. Even with and John Banks. Even with the large sums of money at their disposal, grac-iously donated by the CIA, they are incompetent murderers. Cowards who take the money and send their cannon fodder, many their cannon todder, many of them ex Paras or discharged Brits, off to kill or be killed in Africa or the Middle East, and people have asked why they aren't arrested. One reason may be their links with the Army and the Police. Banks, who framed Eddie Higgins recently, boasted in court of his links with the SAS, but more likely the fact is that they are useful fall guys

to have around. The Gov to have around. The Gov ernment can let them spou off on TV while the really shadowy figures operate in secrecy and with government complicity.

These men are the respectable, well connected members of the officers clubs in London. They have friends in Parliament and in big business. Right wing fanatics like Colonel David stirling, original founder of the SAS who has been involved in providing mercenaries in the middle east and Africa with fascist organisations such as Capricorn (Africa) and watchguard (Saudi Arabia). Both those organisations have collapsed, as, apparently has stirlings GBT5 but men like Stirling and General Sir Walter Walker, former C in C Allied Forces Northern Europe who cist organisations such as Northern Europe who formed a similar group called Unison in 1973 are still around.

Even more hypocritical

and murderous is the role played by the British Government itself. On 25th November 1975 Roy Mason, the paranoid dwarf who longs to be Charles Atlas, admitted that "206 members of HM Armed members of HM Armed Forces are currently serving on loan with the Sultan of Oman's armed forces. In addition, a limited number of HM was given leave from their regiments in Dhofar in support of the Sultan's forces. It is not the practice to give details of ice to give details of operational deployments. 523 members of HM for-ces are also serving on the RAF staging post on Mas irah Island and four are on the permanent staff of HM embassy, Muscat."

The Sunday Times of 4th July 1976 updated these figures "In Oman about 360 officers and NCO's were serving the Sultan, of whom about one-third e under contract distinction is made between contract and sec-

onded soldiers in fighting the left-wing rebels. Over the past two and a half years. Allied (Omani Iranian & Brit) casualties have included 500 dead. During the past 5 years 11 members of the SAS have been killed in action".

Dear Sir:
In your issue of 5
May 1977, you report on
the intervention of Amnesty International into the situation of Portlaoise Prison and related matters. Any help from any quarter for the Portlaoise prisoners is to be welcomed. But we presume you are well aware that the International Executive and Secretariat controlling Amnesty have scarcelyhidden reasons for doing this. Among ons for doing this. Among their many reasons are to boost the current Irish Amnesty effort to increase its membership, as well as to try and regain ground lost after it was made known last year that at least one Free State Government Free State Government Minister and numerous deputies of the Coalition Government parties are members of Amnesty but their main reason is to forward British Governand NATO As you know

at Strasbourg about British torture in Northern Ireland greatly emb-arrassed the British Government and received scant attention in the British Press. But when the Irish Times printed its revel-ations about torture and police brutality in South-ern.lreland, it was blazoned across all British news-papers and TV screens-because it was in the interests of the British Government policy to do so. One of the main sources of foundation income of Amnesty International is the Rowntree Trust. The A.I. money from this source comes directly from the British Govern-ment via British intellig-ence. This helps to ensure that A.I. is a vehicle for furthering British Government interests. Currently, it is in the interests of the British Government to highlight repression Southern Ireland. Ireland, and

so Amnesty International is now being used to further this particular aspect of its policy. I am sure you are well aware that the Free State Government initiated the Strasbourg case also to further its own interests, as well as to cover its own repression at home. But the overall enemy is the British Government, however bad the Cosgrave Government is. It is because of British Gov-ernment policies past and present that the Free State Government exists, that repression of Republican prisoners & sympathisers exists, and that Occupied Ireland and its troubles exists. While it might exists. While it might be in the short-term in-terests of Irish Republicans and others in the South of Ireland to have re-pression there publicised, one should beware of lett-ing oneself be used to further the interests of the

British government. In your 5 May report on Amnesty, you mention its spokesman, Mr. Clayton Yeo. I am enclosing a copy of a newspaper article in which Mr. Yeo is featured in a not too heroic role. The matter concerned the case of Mr. George Lennox, the first prisoner we ever worked for. A resume of his case is enclosed, but the full 4000-word story the full 4000-word story of his case was published by Republican News just over 3 years ago. It was partly through the lies, cheating and abominable duplicity of the Amnesty Executive and Secretariat that the orginal George Lennox, Support Committee became the nucleus of HAPOTAC in September 1974. While working for George Lenn-ox we learned through our intensive investig-ations of a massive involving the Labour Governscandal the Wilson Wilson Labour Govern-ment and Amnesty Int-ernational. This scandal was far bigger than the one in the USA which toppled Nixon. Briefly, toppled Nixon. Briefly, from 1964 to 1966 reports

of British torture and brutality in Aden came flood-ing to the A.I. HQ in London. But no one took any notice. Then Swedish Amnesty sent a top doctor to Aden. He found all the allegations were true. allegations were true.
His report to London was "stolen" at American "stolen" at Amnesty HQ. But a copy sent to Swedish Amnesty was published. This brought down the wrath of the British-government. They made Amnesty HQ shelve the Swedish report and bring out other mild and even falsified reports. Not satisfied with this they made the founder and President of Amnesty-Peter Benenson-resign, together with his secretarygeneral Swann. George Lennox, unknowingly, Lennox, unknowingly, became part of all this. But the enclosed will tell you more.

We are segrated from the other prisoners for our visits. A policewoman searches our visitors and then assists in the supervision of the visit, obviously quite unlawfully. Since these visits are not in operation next door in Parkhurst, it must clearly be this Governor who is responsible. We still await Frank Maguire await Frank Maguire M.P. to fulfill his promise M.P. to fulfill his promise to investigate this and other complaints. Fr. Fell is going ahead with his solicitor to bring charges against the Home Secretary and certain prison staff for alleged assault and ill treatment following and III treatment following the incident last September. ARGENTINA

I am writing to you on the situation in Argentina so as to inform your readers. As you know Bri-tish imperialism since its invasion of Argentina in 1806 maintained us as an unofficial colony up to around 1930.

Today it is American imperialism which dominates our country together with the local military forces-which have unleashed a fierce repression on the Argentine people. The mil-ltary government which

came to power in March of last year, led by Gen-eral Videla has in one year murdered 5,000 or year murdered 5,000 or more workers, artists, law-yers, teachers and others, and has placed 20,000 political prisoners in Jall. These political prisoners are in constant danger of execution and constantly appear in the news as "shot trying to escape" or as "guerillas" killed in confrontations with the armed forces.

The popular masses of

Argentina brought down the last military gover-nment which came to power in 1966 and they will certainly bring down this murderous regime. There have already been many strikes, go-slows and sab-otage actions in the car industry, the ports and the electricity generating in-dustry. But the need for solidarity is urgent particularly around the pol-itical prisoners and here those engaged in the Relatives Action Committees in the occupied six-counties and in the Irish Civil Rights Association in the South, should make their voices heard. Imperialism is our enemy and yours, repression is too, and the freedom of political prisunites our struggles.

BREAKING FROM OUR CHAINS-

In recent weeks I have written about many different questions. From the Brits policy of "Ulsterisation" and their use of Loyalist counter-gangs, to the Sticks acceptance of partition. From "Bloody Sunday" in Istanbul, to the Orange splits and the Brits next moves.

This week's article will allow regular readers a respite from the usual heavy blast of political comment and analysis!

SLAVE MENTALITY

The Brits do not only impose their army upon us. Pro-Brit "thinking" is also imposed. The core of it is to promote a lack of confidence in our own ability to control our

promote a lack of confidence of the property o

We are engaged in a war to throw off our chains. To smash the "subject" status of the Irish people. We are striving to release the creative potential of each individual and of the nation as a whole. To achieve self-determination as people and as a nation.

CREATIVE ENERGY.

Despite the the grim reality of eight years of war can be no doubt on one question. The Republican struggle stands as a tremendous tribute to what creative energy unlocked if the right keys are turned.

As well as the notable acts given publicity, many deed of heroic resistance go unrecorded. Every day people exceed all expectations of what they can

achieve.

By successfully organising together, people have grown in self-confidence, both as individuals and as communities. This process will need to continue. The working class people through all ireland will need to band together. To kick out not just the Brits, but their way of life as well. To set up a Socialist Republic.

PEOPLES ASSEMBLIES

This target means giving direction to the revolutionary temper of the people. It means attempting to make permanent gains from popular activity. It means having as many "grass-roots" organisations as possible.

This is the road to Peoples Assemblies. To channel

the creative energy of the people into building alternative structures to the Orange power-structures maintained by the

But Peoples Assemblies are not the main point of this article. I want to point directly to the need to develop self-confidence and to use our abilities on more specific ground.

HEARTS AND MINDS.

The current war is being waged on many fronts. The military struggle, combined with the resistance in the streets, the countryside and the prisons, is central. The propaganc war is also a critical front.

The Brits wage a continual "hearts and minds" campaign directed at the nationalist people. They use every trick in the book. One day it's the "peace" people, next day it's the sticks, today it's the SDLP.

They expend enormous effort promoting their "acceptable" picture of why they continue to occupy the North. A ploture projected here, to the South, to Britain and to the rest of the world.

and to the rest of the world.

Their superior resources do not mean we face defeat on the propaganda front. Many people, including both the Irish and British people nave their own experiences of the lies of the media. When did a daily paper last support a progressive working class strike, either in Ireland or Britain. and to the rest of the world.

CRUEL TRUTH.

Fertille ground exists. Cultivation is necessary. We need continually to explain our actions to a wide audience. Truth is a very useful ally.

The Brits lies. They seem incapable of telling the

truth. Either about their actions or the political sit-uation. We need to continually expose the cruel truth of the naked brutality which lies behind the glossy cover of smug

Brit hypocrisy.
It is on this front that volunteers are needed.
Blasting the Brits continues to be very necessary but is not enough on its own. In order to beat the Brits the propaganda war must also be fought.

This means people writing. It means them writing for this paper. It means them selling this paper. It means them writing for existing local newssheets and creating new ones.



REGULAR SCRIBES.

Myself and other regular scribes such as Peter Arniis, Vindicator, Brownie and Solon, have never written for any paper before this one. To my knowledge, none of us were even into letter writing-too much like hard work. But between us we have now written many articles. Some not so good, some excellent. But generally the trend is for them to improve. But we are not a special elite. We are not the sole holders of the 'truth' through the written word.

What we need is more people to write. No training

What we need is more people to write. No training is necessary. All that is needed is a bit of time and a pen and paper to help express your fellings and ideas.

ORGANISE AND CLARIFY.

There is no need to go away and read hundreds of books on the history of Ireland, strategles of guerrilla war, or how the Brits drenched the world in blood to build an

To record one's own experiences of the Brits, or of a meeting, and to organise existing ideas, is where to begin. Just to sit down and make a few notes on any particular point of special interest. Do not be afraid to "lift what has already been written. Ideas and words, whether spoken or written, should not be private spoken property.

Writing a few notes can be a great help in clarifying one's ideas. Or even writing a letter. In fact this article was sparked off by just that.

ARMAGH PRISON.
A final point. One peculiar thing about this paper is that it is totally written by men! Given the central role of women in this war, how come this is so?

Armagh prison testified that a women's place is hardly restricted to the "kitchen sink". And why do we only carry regular articles from the Kesh?

Three years ago, Sinn Fein in Andytown, produced an excellent little pamphlet of prison writings from two comrades then in Brixton prison, now in Armagh. As one of them wrote then.

"At least our Volunteers know what they are giving their lives for, that's the difference between the idealist and the cannon fodder of the British Government."


LOYALIST STRONGHOLD

Once again Republican News has received details of an attempt by the RUC to illi min-ate one of the Nationalist people. Only on Monday morning of last week a teenager from the Short Strand area was arrested at his home under section 10 of the P.T.A. by RUC Special Branch and a substantial back up of Brits. The boy was transported by the Brits to the "Torture Centre" on the transported by the Brits to the "Torture Centre" on the Castlereagh Rd., were he was handed over to the RUC for interogation. The interogations began almost immediately with the 'Branch men' spending their energies trying to 'persuade' him to sign statements admit-ting being involved in a number of attacks on Brits and RUC of attacks on Brits and RUC carried out by the IRA over the past months. Fortunately the lad refused to be cornered by their threats and bluffs (they told him if he didn't sign, they would charge him anyway with "being a member of the Junior IRA"] and resisted signing.

IRA" and resisted signing. Exasberated and realising that they would not be able to 'con' this teenager the RUC conseq-uently took a decision to repay him for his 'stuborness'. He was taken from the interogation rooms at around 4 o'clock and told he was being allowed to go home. But 'going home' apparently has a different

definition to the RUC, than it has for us. For rather than being left back to his home in the 'Strand' he was driven to an RUC patrol car to Willowfield St., in the heart of the Loyalist Woodstock Rd., and ordered to get out. At this the lad began to object strongly to which one. to get out. At this the lad began to object strongly, to which one of the RUC replied "Get out you fenian bastard before we tell those lads at the corner where you come from." Trembling with fear, the lad got out of the car to find himself confonted by the group of youths at the corner. Lucklly for him, though he had wits enough to start running before they had the opportunity to approach him the opportunity to approach him and heading in the direction of the Short Strand amost a mile away) he reached saftey in a matter of minutes, no thanks to the RUC. This kind of story is neithing, new to the people of the RUC. SYDNEY REPORT DEGRADING from Sydney, Australia

One of Ireland's democratically elected representatives visited Sydney on a trade mission during April The fearless coalition T.D. other than Minister for was none Industry & Commerce, Mr. Keating (Lab.). Among the reception com-mittee who welcomed Mr. Keating to Sydney were Mr Jim Gallagher and Mr Bob Cunningham who had fasted four days in token sympathy with the 20 Portlaoise Hunger Strikers. To show our visitor how much in touch the Irish in Sydney and the Sydney people are with the Irish political scene there were 600 signatures registered to present to Mr. Keating in protest at the treatment being meted out in Irish jails to Irish Political Prisoners. These signatures included Mr. signatures included Mr.

Also on hunger strike was Also on hunger strike was 18 year old Dymphna Reevey of Sydney whose father comes from Co. Fermanagh and whose mother is from Belfast.

On the Ministers arrival at the Wentworth Hotel on a Sydney Sunday night Mr. Keating made a fast entrance to his luxurious suite and with eyes firmly focused on the concrete pavement failed to greet or see his fellow Irish men and women who so earnestly awaited his arrival. This did not deter the now cold, and hungry Irish citizens who stood under the southern sky thousands of miles from their native land. They understood Mr. Keating and company were tired after their long trip and in the light of morning when well rested Mr. Keat-ing, they felt, would see and talk to them and accept the petition.

Alas, this was not to be although assured by the commonwealth police (who were protecting our Minister) that Mr.Keating had agreed, at their recommendation, to meet two of the four Sydney hunger strikers on Monday night after he had wined and dined with friends and guests of the import-export board. who had stood orderly and patiently for 80 hours patiently for 80 nours outside had no reason to doubt the word of the plain-clothes policeman who its seemed had become Mr. Keating's messenger boy. Senator Tony Mulville requested permission to accompany the two reps., who it was now agreed would be Bob and Jim, on this most important mission and to stress the urgency of

they wished to discuss with Mr. Keating.

Hopes were high among the fifty odd Irish people who had now assembled outside the beautiful Wentworth Hotel. Friends and relatives of Ireland's 20 Hunger Strikers were in small groups talking of things at home with emotion in their quietly spoken words as they eagerly awaited the return of Bob, Jim and Sen. Mulville who went through the glass doors at 8.p.m. accompanied by two commonwealth police and the manager. The scene inside the grand hotel was any-thing but hopeful. After a twenty minute wait in a corridor it became clear to the deputation that the now well rested, well fed Mr. Keating was not going to meet them. This may have come as a dissappointment to Bob and Jim but to Sen. Mulville it came with shocked disbellef as a request of this type had never been refused him before in his long political career. During this waiting (20 minutes) there was one tireless gentleman making trips into the lavish banqueting room to report the requests of the deputat ion to have Mr. Keating step out to the hallway for a brief moment. It was with apologies all around that this one tireless diplomat had to report to the deputation that under no circumstances would Mr Keating meet them.

New Govenor Willie John Kerr taking hard line



Everyone is by now well aware of the degrading treatment being meted out to our comrades in "H" ong Kesh.


though this were not bad enough. Kerr has ordered those men now B wing must now be held completely naked in solitary confinement.
