The Five Demands of Irish republican Prisoners

- 1. The Right not to wear a prison uniform.**
- 2. The Right not to do prison work.**
- 3. The Right of free association with other prisoners.**
- 4. The Right to organise their own educational and recreational facilities.**
- 5. The Right to one visit, one letter and one parcel per week.**

The Blanket Protest, No-Wash Protest and Hunger Strikes were part of a struggle by Irish Republican prisoners to regain the political status that Republican Prisoners were entitled to.

In 1976 the British Government made a decision to use the prisoners as pawns whereby they would criminalise the struggle for Irish freedom. All prisoners sentenced after 1st March 1976 would be treated as criminals and made to endure the infamous 'H-Blocks', denied political status and treated like common criminals. In defence of their rights our prisoners were forced to embark on the prison protests refusing to wear a 'convicts uniform'. After years of deprivation, inhumane treatment and brutality they reluctantly but with determination began a hunger strike demanding political status.

Tonight we honour some of those who endured Britain's campaign of torture and repression during that struggle.
