# TWO YEARS OF ENGLISH ATROCITIES IN IRELAND

### English Atrocities in Ireland, 1917-18.

"Centuries of brutal and often ruthless injustice, and what is worse..., centuries of insolence and insult have driven hatred of British rule into the very marrow of the Irish race. The long records of oppression, proscription and expatriation have formed the greatest blot on British fame of equity and eminence in the realm of government. There remains ... the invincible fact that to-day she [Ireland] is no more reconciled to British rule than she was in the days of Cromwell."

These words were spoken in the English Parliament by the present English Prime Minister (Mr. Lloyd George) on March 7th, 1917. His evidence is clear that now, as always, the people of Ireland are uncompromisingly opposed to the government of the Irish Nation by England. Mr. Lloyd George attributes this to centuries of rnthless injustice, insolence and out age. There is a deeper cause. The Irish Nation, having a tradition and a c. vilisation of its own, desires, as earnestly as every other cultured people, to e press both to the world. To do this under alice rule has been found to be improsible. That it may be done is the great ambition of the Irish people, and the national ambition is in turn the explanation of the endless struggle made in J.eland against English rule, generation after generation,

It is because Ireland and thus battled bravel, for the expression of the Gaelicideal that there have been visited upon her puple the interminable oppression proscription, and expatriation, to which Mr. Lloyd George, as Prime Minister of England, confesses. But Mr. Lloyd George was careful not to speak the full truth. Had he done so he would have proved that not on, v is the Irish Nation in the year 1917 "no more reconciled to British rule than she was in the days of Cromwell" but that in that year also, and subsequently, the trish Nation has been subjected to governmental methods excusable only in such epochs as that in which Cromwell made history in Ireland.

This volume gives the added condemnation of English Government in Ireland from which Mr. Lloyd George was careful to refrain. Instead of its being true, as he suggests, that English oppression, injustice and ruthlessness belong entirely to the past, it is evident from the following pages that the methods used by the English Government in Ireland have never changed. If in modern times these methods are called by new names, in substance they remain persistently the same.

The period taken to exemplify the "good government of Ireland" consists of the years 1917-1918. This selection is made for two reasons. Firstly, that this statement may definitely disprove that usual suave explanation of English statesmen that not they but their grandfathers persecuted Ireland; secondly, because in the years mentioned the English Government, under whose direction the acts to be cited

were committed, was loudest in its lamentations over the oppression of subject

These lists of outrages committed by English agents in Ireland during the two years mentioned have been compiled from the daily newspapers published in Ireland. For that reason they have a particular interest. Before publication each of the stems in this volume had by special injunction to be submitted to the English Censor. Therefore in these lists figure only those acts the commission of which the English Government itself admits. This volume could be enlarged considerably by the addition of atrocious acts of 'English agents and soldiery not permitted by the Censor to appear in the Press. It is, however, thought that the number of shees admitted violations is so great that no further addition to them is needed to convince foreign peoples of this fact: that to-day just as ruthlessly as in the past English Gevernment in Ireland consists in outrage and oppression.

Although the Insurrection of 1916 had already been eight months suppressed, the year 1917 opens in Ireland with unabated aggression. Arrests for the most trivial political offences are continual. Sentences the most vicious are passed upon those who have been unjustly seized. Innocent men are secreted in criminal prisons, there we suffer almost unshelievable indignities which will subsequently be detailed. Public assemblies are attacked by military and police. Men, women, and even children, are beaten down in the public streets by an armed, military police force organised not for the preservation of internal peace but for the forcible sustainment of the English usurpation. Some are even killed in these unlicensed attacks upon the general body of the people. Proclamations declaring illegal and criminal popular meetings, traditional assemblies, processions and celebrations, and, in some districts, even fairs and markets, are uttered by English military commanders and are relenticedly enforced by English soldiery and English-controlled police.

No imprisonment, arrest, sentence, batoning, raid or suppression is mentioned in this volume which is in any way the result of offences against the ordinary criminal code. The acts with which England is here charged are exclusively acts against persons innocent of any crime save that of championing the freedom of their own nation against a power which seems to be opposed to the very existence of the Gaelic people. Records of the ordinary criminal classes receive no mention in any portion of these pages. In spite of the evil system of alien government which for so long has obtained in Ireland, the people have powerfully preserved the National honour. Offences against the criminal code have been always few in Ireland. English soldiery and police were, as these lists indicate, exceedingly active in both years, 1917-1918. Raids and arrests followed one another without cessation, English courts sat in constant session sentencing hundreds of Irishmen and women to long terms of imprisonment. Yet the same English Government which directs this oppression was constrained to admit through its regular judges that Ireland was in the very same period practically crimeless. The Judges of Assize, before whom every serious criminal offence is brought were, both in 1917 and 1918, almost unanimous in congratulating the people in the various Irish counties upon the general absence of crime.

On March 1st, 1917, Mr. Justice Gibson said at Co. Wicklow Assizes:-

"As far as the general state of the country was concerned he was informed, as was the usual pleasing experience of Judges of Assize, that it was in its ordinary peaceful and satisfactory condition."

On the same date the Lord Chief Justice said at Trim Assizes:

"It was gratifying to him on this the first occasion as one of his

Majesty's Judges going on Assize, to congratulate them on the peaceful state of the county. There were only two cases to go before the Grand Jury."

In 1918, as in 1917, the expressions of Judges of Assize were as definitely favourable. Mr. Justice Ross, speaking at Waterford City on March 4th, 1918, said:—

"There was actually no return of any crime in connexion with the city. It was a very gratifying circumstance, because one would expect in a city such as that, that crimes aggravated or less aggravated would take place. It was a great credit to the people."

A few days later Lord Justice Madden said at Co. Fermanagh:-

"From the returns and information laid before him he found there was nothing to suggest that the country was in anything but a satisfactory condition." \*

These judges are appointed by England, usually for their Anglophil bias against the people and not for their legal attainments. But hostile though they are, they continually find themselves forced by facts to acknowledge the respect in which the people hold the common law. It is the condemnation of all her interference in treland that while England's police magistrates and courts-martial seek every day to create criminals, her own judges have to make public profession of this nation's crimelessness.

In order that those who read may the more readily understand how general as well as how serious is English Tyranny in Ireland the violence committed upon this law-abiding people in the years under consideration has thus been summarised:—

\* In these two years, 1917-'18, the Judges of Assize all over Ireland commented upon the crimelessness of the country. This table will surprise any who live out of Ireland. To those who live in Ireland, who see men seized in the public streets, deported without even a charge being brought against them, sentenced by enemy officers—to those who live among these daily incidents such totals of hostile acts will seem inadequate. And so, in fact, they are; because here we are dealing only with admitted aggression against the men and women of Ireland. Other acts have occurred which in due time will also be charged against the English usurpation.

For persons not directly aware of the conditions extant in Ireland these further explanatory notes are necessary.

The courts-martial—thirty-six of which were held in 1917 and sixty-two in 1918, and which are with increasing frequency still being employed in Ireland—are composed of officers of the English Army. They sit to "try" alleged political offences under a special code of discriminatory enactments designed to substitute for trial by jury the summary justice of the army of occupation; the "judges," who are necessarily steeped in political prejudice, have no legal experience or knowledge, and it is only in very rare cases that they have the help of a competent and impartial legal assessor to guide them; they are generally left to the safer guidance of their own instincts.

Not even this method of ensuring the conviction of political offenders is, however, considered sufficient. In addition a special institution known as the "Crimes Court" has been set up in Ireland. It consists of one or two or more magistrates specially selected by the English Viceroy. These magistrates are often ex-officers of the English army of occupation, and are always men with political views definitely hostile to the views of the people. They act without a jury, and their jurisdiction is not limited to any one county. In other words, the Lord Lieutenant, having discovered two or more willing tools, can and does send them to any part of Ireland where the conviction and imprisonment of certain men and women are desired. In actuality the "Crimes Court" is a sort of ambulatory court-martial made the meaner by its effort to masquerade as an evidence of democratic justice.

Further, in the 269 sentences passed in 1917 upon innocent men and women, and

the greater number in the year following, it will be found that in addition to the sentence for the political offence with which they were charged there was frequently added a further sentence "in default of ball." The meaning of this is that unless the accused person admits himself a criminal and gives security for his "good behaviour" and an undertaking to abstain from further crime the sentence and the addition become for him one long term of imprisonment. As will well be understood, workers in the national movement in Ireland refuse to admit the criminality of their patriotism and they suffer accordingly. It is indeed with the knowledge that they will do so that the magistrates impose the further sentence.

Considerable as is the total of 719 hostile acts committed against the people of Ireland in the year 1917, it is completely eclipsed by the total for the succeeding year. The following table has in it much of interest for those who believe in what Mr. Lloyd George has called "British fame of equity and eminence in the realm of government":—

If Ireland had no other claim, the above table would itself justify the liberation of this ancient people. In twelve months no less than 2,624 definite acts of war have been committed against its people. This colossal total includes six murdersmen shot or bayonetted in public places or slowly-murdered in prison. It includes also 81 attacks upon the general body of the people-attacks by armed government forces upon unarmed civilians. To foreign peoples the cause and circumstance of these cowardly assaults need to be detailed. The police in Ireland are armed always with thick batons, a blow from which has frequently proved fatal. For several years past they almost as constantly carry rifles fitted with bayonets. They are under the control and direction of officers alien in sentiment and often in race to the peopleofficers who miss no opportunity of creating a conflict between people and police As a result the public cheering of political prisoners has frequently been made the cause of a whole series of baton-charges upon defenceless citizens. In the city of Cork the writer has seen the police charge with bayonets a procession of unarmed men and women whose only offence was to assemble at a national monument and recite prayers for the Irish leaders executed in 1916. Since that occurrence there has been a further refinement of this particular method of "good government." Baton and bayonet charges have since actually occurred in public halls where there was no way of escape for the assaulted people. On 9th of April, 1918, the police batoned the people of Dungarvan who were gathered in the local courthouse to hear the trial of a political prisoner. On the 24th March previously English soldiery broke into a schoolhouse at Carrigaholt, Co. Clare, and attacked with bayonets a number of young men who were using the place as a reading room. It was in this gruesome incident that Thomas Russell was mortally wounded. Five days later he died of his wounds. In Cork City, and in the Counties of Kerry, Clare and Tipperary other men have been killed in the public streets by a police force whose pretence it is to keep the peace. In all the 81 baton and bayonet charges which occurred in Ireland in the year 1918, there must have been many thousands of people injured. In cities the hospitals are often crowded after one of these attacks.

This table for 1918 shows that there were 260 raids made by the military and police. These raids are often specially organised to strike the terror of English might into the hearts of the people. Frequently they take place at night, and whole districts are submitted to the provocation of foreign soldiers breaking into private houses after dark and, upon the most trivial pretext, making exhaustive searches The 260 raids mentioned will be seen from the appended lists to be not raids on 260 houses only but on innumerable houses on 260 different occasions-in one year.

It will further be seen from this summary that 91 men and women were, in the year 1918, seized and deported. Against none of these was any charge levelled. They occupied the most honourable positions in the gift of every subject peopleleadership in the struggle for national liberation. Thirty-three of the deportees were, while still lying untried in English prisons, elected by great majorities to seats in the National Parliament of Ireland, at the General Election of December, 1918. These deported men and women have since been released, without apology, explanation, or any charge being preferred against them. Two are dead. Many are broken in health, some so seriously that no hope is entertained of their complete recovery

Not even a semblance of free speech is allowed to exist in Ireland. In this same year of 1918 as many as thirty-two proclamations were issued declaring unlawful national activity of every kind and culminating, on July 4th, 1918, in an official declaration that every assembly of the Irish people in any part of Ireland was from that date illegal and criminal. Men, who, denying the right of any alien government so to proclaim, spoke publicly after that date were tried by courts-martial and were, for that act alone, and without any relation to the words spoken, in many cases, given the atrocious sentence of two years hard labour, which is accounted equal to a sentence of 15 years penal servitude. Not satisfied with this effort to stifle the national voice, persons who were known to have been listeners to these speeches were arrested, tried by enemy officers, and, as in the case mentioned in the lists of sentences under date October 1st, were actually sent to a criminal jail for three months. Added to this determined endeavour to silence even verbal opposition to their ruthlessness in Ireland, the English usurpation suppressed-in one year!twelve newspapers and prohibited the foreign circulation of twenty-eight others! While England thus endeavoured to keep from the world all knowledge of her merciless regime in this country she committed a meaner act still. She traduced her gagged victim in every corner of Europe and America and vilely represented acts springing from her own provocation as evidence of the Irish people's lawlessness and their intrigues with foreign governments.

In continuing our study of the summary above published, we find two totals more

enormous than any yet commented upon-those of the arrests and sentences. It seems hardly possible that outside Tzarist Russia almost a thousand people should be sentenced in one year-in the vast majority of cases cruelly sentenced-for political "offences." In this Ireland hanging limp in the grip of a nearer and equally ruthless Prussianism there were, in 1918, 973 men, women, and, indeed. children, punished-most of them brutally-merely for demanding for their nation the right to nationhood. Public servants, members of civic bodies, of the learned professions, poets and artists, leaders of National and Social parties, all these, as well as humbler workers, have come under the lash of the English knout. And this total of 973 sentences, great as it is, does not include the 88 Irishmen and three Lrishwomen deported and imprisoned for ten months-without even undergoing the formality of having sentence passed upon them. Neither does it include scores of men kept, in some cases for months, in criminal prisons and then silently released untried but effectively punished.

The offences for which these 973 persons were wantonly punished are in the main of three classes :-

(1) Public speaking.

(2) Possession of arms or other military equipment, or appearing publicly in military formation.

(3) Possession of documents "which IF published MIGHT cause disaffection." The great majority of the sentences, the cause of which has not been particularised in the appended lists, are the results of one or other of these three classes of "crime" In addition innumerable "offences" have been invented by proclamation. On October 1st, 1918, a boy was sent for one month to a criminal settlement for carrying a Sinn Fein flag. A few weeks afterwards a young man was given five months imprisonment for "being in the company of boys carrying a Sinn Fein flag." On October 13th, 1918, for "whistling derisively at the police" a youth was sent to gaol for one month. Many Irishmen and women have been incarcerated in criminal prisons for speaking the Irish language. For singing National songs one man was sentenced to two years hard labour, and many others, including girls, to lesser terms. These and similar "crimes" created by an English Government enduringly hostile to the people are the offences for which 973 men, women and children are classed as criminals in Ireland.

In Ireland, sex is no guarantee that the brutality of tyrants will not be visited apon national workers. Three delicate women were among those deported in May, two of whom were subsequently released in broken health. Seventeen girls and women were sentenced for speaking Irish or collecting for memorials to men murdered by the English enemy. Among those arrested 22 were women and girls, several of the latter being under 18 years of age. Neither does old age command any respect from the government under which Ireland suffers. Among those deported many men were past middle age, and two were over sixty. Among those arrested in Ireland was one man of 70 years of age and many men of fifty upwards. Extreme youth stands as little chance of generous treatment in this all embracing scheme of provocation. In glancing through the appended lists the reader will come across mention of the arrest or sentence of no less than eighteen boys. But at this moment of writing (March 20th, 1919) a greater infamy than any is in course of perpetration. A boy of eleven was, six weeks ago, kidnapped by police in his parents house in Co. Tipperary and has ever since been secreted away so securely that his mother can find no trace of him and can get no word of his whereabouts from the English authorities who hold him. Since they have seized this child of eleven the police have become bolder, and more recently they have arrested a boy of 13 whom they have also at a nameless place. They have made no statement regarding these children. It is believed they have seized them to extract information from them. Of what means they are using to turn such infants into English spies there is nothing known. The word of enemy officials is all the assurance the nation has that these children still live.

The arrest of 1,107 innocent persons in Ireland in twelve months is the measure of liberty which the nation enjoys under the English usurpation. It is also the measure of the lengths to which the alien Government in Ireland has had to go in its fruitless efforts to stifle the national demand for freedom. These 1,107 men have been seized, usually in their beds at night. They were thrown into prison, and if subsequently no charge was discovered against them many of them were allowed to remain for several months in criminal settlements and were then elected "without a stain on their characters." But with the aid of their courts-martial, their "Crimes Courts" and their police magistrates, the English agents were enabled to secure the conviction of all but 134 of those whom they arrested.

Not even when they have been thus tyrannously torn from their homes and cast into prison are these Irish victims of alien aggressions free from further indignity Irish political prisoners, instead of enjoying a treatment more humane than that accorded criminals, are, in fact, the victims of a special prison regime that can only be termed barbaric. Exaggeration though it may seem to be, it has nevertheless been proved that into the Irish prisons police have been frequently introduced who have batoned these helpless men in their cells. Prisoners are put into irons on the slightest pretext. At the moment of writing the political prisoners in Belfast Jail have been in handcuffs for five weeks. In Belfast Prison also men have, by order of the Governor, been drenched by a fire hose and then left to lie in their wet clothes all night-manacled and unable to assist themselves. In Mountjoy Prison. Dublin, prisoners were also hosed, and it was in that place that one of the worst of the Irish prison tragedies occurred. Thomas Ashe, and many comrades, making a protest against criminal treatment, went on hunger strike. All the furniture was removed from their cells, and towards the end of September, 1917, they were left half naked, and weak from four days hunger, lying on the cold stone floors of their cells. The leaders of the protest were then carried into the basement and forcibly fed by an inexperienced doctor so effectively that Thomas Ashe collapsed and did not recover. Every month men are thrown out from these Irish prisons lamentably broken in health and often in physique. In these many and terrible ways is England's love of justice shown. In the following enormous lists of atrocious acts is contained the proof of her hatred of all oppression and of the honesty of Mr. Lloyd George's suggestion that only in the past were the methods used by England in the subjugation of Ireland ruthless, oppressive and unjust.

### BATON AND BAYONET CHARGES.

1918.
